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SCHOOL AND HOME.

For generations the child's coming of school age has been hailed by his parents as five hours' daily release from responsibility, while the teachers' profession has been held as especially desirable for "ladies" because "they come in contact with so few people."

A school entertainment may call out a crowd, a child delinquent in lessons or behavior is a signal for a confab between disgruntled parents and despairing teacher, but this is about all. Of real working knowledge, on either side, of the equipment and ideals of the other, there is none. The parents who would not buy a breakfast without seeing it trust the education of their child to a total stranger. The teacher, wondering why all her efforts at instruction fall on barren soil, never troubles to find out whether current is setting against her in the child's home life.

Most school difficulties, lack of equipment, disciplinary troubles, etc., arise from this lack of intimacy between the two factors most vitally concerned, the school and the home.

The Parent-Teacher organizations which bring home and school together frequently are of the greatest value in remedying this condition, which must be remedied if the awakening interest in education is to accomplish anything vital.

This co-operative action is not a matter of civic or federal concern, but of individual concern to every parent who has a child of school age, to every taxpayer who would like to know whether he is getting his money's worth and to every educator who must know its foundation if he hopes to build on lasting superstructure.

FRANCE WANTS LEAGUE NOW.
It is strange, the change that has come over France lately in respect to the League of Nations.

When President Wilson returned to America, many French editors and statesmen were frankly critical or cynical about the League of Nations plan. They seemed to take the position that they had accepted something for which they had no real inclination, yielding to Mr. Wilson even against their own judgment, out of deference to the United States. They were willing to stand for the League of Nations, but they did so grudgingly.

All at once a different tone appeared. The opposition to the plan that developed in the United States was a shock to the French. It suddenly dawned on those sarcastic Paris critics that the League which they had accepted as a foregone conclusion was in danger. And their feeling was not at all what might have been expected from their utterances. They were now relieved. They were seized with consternation.

That despised league began all at once to appear as something extremely desirable. They saw that though it was far from perfect from their standpoint, it offered more security than any alternative in sight. And so the erstwhile critics and denouncers have begun praising the Constitution and

turning their indignation against the American enemies of the plan. The situation in Great Britain is much the same.

It is not strange at all, when one considers some ordinary facts of human nature. A person or thing that may be viewed with disdain when it seems to come unsought often turns into something ardently desired when the party of the first part suddenly finds himself in danger of losing it.

Epoch V—1859 to the Present Time—Introducing many men and events worthy of consideration.
