CONGRESSWOMEN

Jeannette Rankin, the Montana congresswoman, is one of the "lame ducks" of the last campaign, if one may be pardoned so ungallant a phrase. Miss Rankin need not feel bad about it, however. Though she may not have covered herself with any particular glory, she certainly showed as much ability as the average congresswoman, and was probably above the average in conscientious devotion to her duty.

If there is anything to be learned from her experience, it is that women are just as liable as men to suffer from the vagaries of political fortune. Politics always was a precarious business. Women thinking of adopting it as a profession may as well recognize it. An office is less dependable than a husband.

As for the return of congress to 100 per cent masculinity, the woman-haters need take no satisfaction from that. It will not last long. There may soon be a crowd of women in

Congress. And the men will treat them with the same respectful consideration they gave to Miss Rankin, and everybody will take them as a matter of course, and everything will run along pretty much the same as before—except that some kinds of legislation, especially that affecting women and children, will be handled more intelligently, and about half the population of the country will be better satisfied.

DO WE KNOW OUR CITY?

During the war the branches of the Girls Patriotic League performed valuable service in keeping young girls in communities near the cantonments and in the cities, constructively occupied. They performed patriotic tasks and contributed in many ways to upholding the morale of soldier and community alike.

Today the League is still finding for itself means of patriotic service. In Springfield, Mass., where there are 20 units of the Girls Patriotic League, that organization is commencing a movement which will make all its girls better fitted for their future citizenship. The work is to be done through a "Know Your City" campaign which will link up the high school civics course with a practical understanding of the problems of municipal administration in Springfield. The girls will hear talks on civic affairs, social welfare work and general community life.

The criticism that New Yorkers know less about their own city than do outsiders is applicable to dwellers in many another city or small town. It has probably been true to a considerable extent of Springfield. However, as the girls of the Patriotic League begin to know their city, their elders are going to know it better, too. If the campaign is properly conducted there is going to be a new interest

taken in needed improvements and reforms and a more intelligent effort to correct the mistakes of the past and avoid them in the future. A "Know Your City" campaign should be productive of many beneficial results.

People who doubt the possibility of universal peace should not overlook the fact that the war is over, and congress is adjourned.

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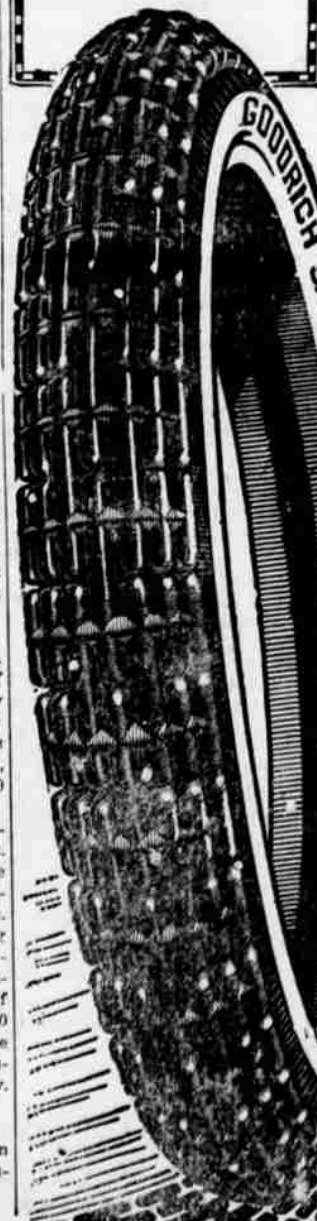
