STANDING BY OUR ALLIES

Those who object to all participation by America hereafter in the affairs of Europe are given a grave rebuke by George W. Wickersham, former attorney general of the United States. In a recent speech in New York City, he declared that by our military contribution to the victory over Germany, "America assumed an equal responsibility with Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan for the consequences of that victory."

"To return home," he continued, "with our armies, leaving European associates alone to struggle with the conditions following war, under any circumstances, would involve abandonment of our allies at one of the most critical moments of our efforts."

"But a moment's reflection," he added, "will show the present impossibility of such action. The American president, with at least the tacit approval of the American people, formulated the terms and conditions of the peace which was to follow our military efforts. These terms and conditions have been accepted substantially by allies and enemies alike as the basis of the peace. They are impossible of performance without the active continued participation of the American nation in the continued enforcement of their provisions."

This result, he explains, is to be accomplished by the natural and obvious process of a League of Nations. While criticizing the present draft of a League Constitution in some particulars, he approves its general structure, and professes himself satisfied that it will serve the purpose when it has been "amended in several particulars, as it doubtless will be."

A British statesman suggests that if the League of Nations conflicts with the constitution of the United States, then we had better get busy and change our little old constitution. No use getting mad about it, though, seeing as many American authorities say there is no conflict.

Ash Swale and Brownsville Items

BROWNSVILLE, Mar. 24.—Special.—The Farm Bureau meeting held at Brownsville Tuesday was a decided success. The meeting was called to order by Local Chairman Otis Taylor. The Odd Fellows Hall was well-filled by farmers and residents of Brownsville who all seemed to take an active interest in club-work. County Chairman W. W. Poland, Agricultural Agent "Farmer Smith," and Miss Joyce of the college all made explanations as to the object of the Farm Bureau meetings. After some discussion by prominent farmers the following committees were appointed: dairying, W. N. Damon; rodent control, Chas. Holloway; poultry, Clarence Templeton; club work, Park Beatty; good roads, Ed Wright; corn growing, Mr. Ferrell; field demonstrations, Otis Taylor; drainage, W. Moore. "Farmer Smith," Linn county's popular agricultural agent, especially commended the farmers in this section on the interest taken in corn-growing and dairying. He said the Brownsville section was the banner corn-growing section of the county, and advised holding a corn fair in Brownsville. Club-work organized in Brownsville schools is also quite promising.

Before the meeting was adjourned a resolution was offered by Fred Harrison, recommending a levy of five mills in Linn county for road purposes. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Cecil Harrison, the Ash Swale poultryman, today took out two Mammoth incubators for his Rosedale Hatchery.

Mr. Harrison has a number of incubators running on the Rosedale Farm but was unable to fill his orders, having had to turn down a number of orders for day-old chicks, and also eggs for hatching. He has 500 as fine O. A. C. white leghorn hens as can be found anywhere, and the most up-to-date poultry farm in this section.

A number of farmers in this section are signing up contracts for loganberry acreage. The big Brownsville Cannery is to soon have competition in this field, as another company is making contracts with the farmers for acreage. The evergreen blackberry and the loganberry industry bids fair to be one of the big industries in this section in the near future.

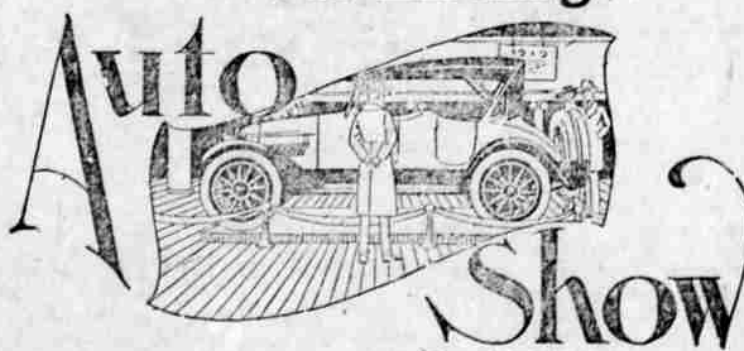
