TWO-BITS FOR UNCLE SAM

Close to 17 million dollars was the investment piled up in two-bit pieces and dollars last year in War Savings Stamps in Oregon. With a thousand-dollar limit on certificates the realization grows that little savings roll up into money. Several counties did not sell 100 per cent of their allotment. In some cases it was due to a heavy quota and changing conditions of population. After all, failure to attain 100 per cent was largely due to lack of energy in local organizations pushing the campaign. There is plenty of money in Oregon. Allowance, too, should be made in some places for the disruption of affairs by the "flu"; otherwise those communities might have completed their quota. In every one of the counties making a material oversubscription there was highly-organized effort.

The best part of the movement is that thrift is being taught by example as well as precept. The government has decided that War Savings stamps are to be retained as a feature of national finance. It is well said that a thrifty nation is a sane nation.

This year's quota for Oregon War Stamps sales is about half that of

last year. War Stamps must be sold to help clear up war debts. It ought not to be difficult to distribute ten or even 20 million dollars in War Savings Stamps in Oregon during the year. The paving power of a fairly prosperous country as well as its productive power was not understood until the big war came along and disclosed it to us.

If the Rhine is internationalized throughout its navigable length, Switzerland at last will have a seaport. And then—if the Peace League plan fails—she can start spending money for a navy.

FILM PROGRESS

The general impression that the movies are improving is corroborated by the testimony of an Ohio minister who has been visiting the big producing plants at Los Angeles and getting acquainted with Chaplin, Fairbanks, et al.

"Of course there are some features of the movies that I do not approve," he says. "I regret that they have become so completely commercialized, for one thing. But that is the curse of most of our so-called amusements. On the whole, the influence of the movies is beneficial, and from what I have seen I have great hopes for the future."

He never had any idea, he says, of the genuine earnestness which characterizes the big stars. "Without exception everyone I met is trying to do bigger and better things. The business has its sordid side, but the really big people in it are not merely chasing the dollars. They are trying to make more artistic and cleaner pictures. I have been as much impressed by the high ideals of the actors and producers as by the immensity of the business."

It is good to know that the worst is over, in the movies. There are still plenty of plays that are objectionable morally or artistically. But the art is improving right along, and all the announcements from important producing sources bespeak a still greater improvement.

Pretty soon the films will really deserve their boasted patronage of 10,000,000 a day.

Snappy Gleanings from Exchanges in Linn and Other Counties of Oregon

President Not Alone—
President Wilson is not the first great president who has had trouble with politicians in congress and the senate is usually the scene of obstruction, says the East Oregonian.

The 'Good Old Times'—
There was a time when the farmer talked about the good old times, but D. A. White is inclined to think there is nothing in the good old times from the viewpoint of the farmer, says the Capital Journal. For instance, he has a paper dated Sept. 6, 1901, about the time that Pres. McKinley was assassinated. And in looking it over he naturally turned to the market reports. Here are a few prices he found: wheat, 48c a bushel; oats, 5c; chest hay, per ton \$6; timothy hay, per ton \$10; flour was selling at from 70 to 85c per sack of 49 pounds. When the farmer brought in his butter that year, he was glad to get from 15 to 17c a pound, and eggs were 15c a dozen. Chickens brought from 5 to 6c a

pound and pork was 5c. Steers brought 3c and cows 21-2c. Dressed veal was sold for 61-2c, potatoes brought 50c a bushel and wool sold at from 11 to 13c a pound.

Would Tie His Hands—

Wilson was right when he appealed to the country last fall to give him democratic support in congress. Republican senators and congressmen are proving that their purpose is not to uphold his hands, but to tie them.
