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GO AFTER PROSPERITY

Some places have prosperity thrust upon them, others just take what comes along, while others go out after it.

In Portland just at present the merchants and professional men have formed a home-building association. Pendleton is selling shares in a similar plan to secure more homes for that city. And the plan is working out splendidly. Other cities are fathoming various other schemes for the upbuilding of their city.

A well-known Albany man presents the idea of promoting a real prosperity program. His plan is simple enough. He says:

"There is no real prosperity which does not benefit all classes, so in pushing for prosperity, if we get it right, all classes—everybody—must get under the load and do his utmost."

"How? Here is the simplest solution; namely, a holding company incorporated to purchase the stock, shares or bonds of industrial institutions which will come to Albany only under such conditions. The shares in the holding company should represent \$100 each and should be paid for in monthly payments of \$10 each. A referendum vote of the shareholders could be used to decide on the institutions to be backed."

"There are few people whose means are so limited as to be an excuse for refraining to buy an interest in their own prosperity. There should be enough people in and around Albany with sufficient sporting blood in their veins to cover a thousand shares. When enough shares have been subscribed a meeting could be called and an organization perfected that would aid in the real upbuilding of Albany. Payrolls is one thing we need and the best way to get them is to encourage companies with products to sell to come here to make those products, and supply labor for a larger population and more work for those already here."

These ideas are presented for your consideration. What do you think of them?

SAVING OUR HISTORY

The state of Wyoming now has an official historian whose duty it is to visit the families of pioneer settlers and learn from their lips stories of the early days of the state.

The person chosen for this task is a woman who has herself recently located and developed a claim of 160 acres which she has turned from raw prairie to a productive farm. She has already served her state as deputy treasurer and as director of the state workmen's compensation department.

The opportunity to get at first hand the reminiscences of those pioneers who moved West as the East became crowded, and who opened up and developed that vast region, is growing rarer. Interest in such tales, too, seems sometimes to lessen in these days of machinery, efficiency, everything ultramodern. Nevertheless many of our finest national characteristics have come to us through the courage and determination and great effort of those pioneers.

As a nation we have grown so fast and so successfully that we are sometimes inclined to forget the character-building, tradition-making struggles of our more recent pioneers. We turn in admiration chiefly to the heroic people who came to our eastern shores from foreign lands and forget the later ones who struck out just as courageously to settle the unknown West.

The Wyoming historian will perform a worthy service for Americans in every state in the Union, as well as her own, if she successfully captures and holds the fleeting vision of those days and the people whom we should be proud to remember and honor. Other states which have not already done something of the kind should follow Wyoming's example.

The campaign plan contemplates a general committee in each community headed by a prominent and trustworthy citizen. The business of this committee is to secure all data with regard to building conditions, supplies and methods of financing. It is to conduct publicity campaigns. Getting in touch with every man who hopes to build, it aims to aid him in his attempt to own his home. More than that, it is hoped to stimulate in the careless and improvident an interest in home ownership and to educate the people generally in its desirability.

The man who owns his own home is emphatically the responsible citizen. He is not likely to be swayed easily by those whose doctrine is to disturb an ordered scheme of life. He has a basis for credit, a foundation for growth, his own self-respect and the respect of his neighbors, all of which makes for solid Americanism.

The "Own Your Own Home" campaign should be pushed enthusiastically everywhere.
