OPPORTUNITY HAS ARRIVED

It is said that opportunity knocks but once at every man's door, and, unanswered, is gone forever. This may not be the entire truth in the present case, but it is certain that opportunity is hanging away on Linn county's and the entire Willamette Valley's front and rear doors with something larger than a sledgehammer. Will she be answered and admitted? It is up to us to say.

Through years of test this valley has been proven the garden spot of the world where any crop of the temperate zone can be successfully grown. This is particularly true of small fruits. The Willamette Valley is adapted to berry and fruit and vegetable culture as is no other place in America.

Our natural bent along the lines of there is a world of our strawberry, cherry and other kinds of juices and preserves. It is canned beans, peas, other vegetables. Not only clamoring for it, but local growers are begging for them and offering most attractive contracts for terms of years if the farmer will but plant in sufficient quantities and deliver them to a convenient shipping point.

Why hesitate? Why delay? The time for planting is at hand. These associations and canneries are offering roots and seed or are able to tell where desirable varieties are to be had at nominal prices. Big profits are to be had by growing these desirable crops. If canneries are to be established here the raw material must first be produced.

The present opportunity does not necessarily call for a cannery, although the local association is willing to build if sufficient quantities of fruit are produced. Outside firms will take all that can be grown and when production reaches an adequate proportion hereabouts the packing plant will follow as a natural sequence and give additional employment to local people.

Are we going to sit still and let this opportunity slip? Are the farmers of Linn and Benton counties going to pass up this chance and let the canneries and packing plants go elsewhere? The answer lies with the grower. He only needs to step up and put his name on a contract that will bring him big returns and agree to produce the desired crops in quantity and his future is assured.

Or, if one prefers, let him plant the varieties that are marketable and take a chance on the markets from year to year. There is no question

that prices will hold up and that Willamette Valley products will become more and more famous. The companies now bidding for materials are spending hundreds of thousands of dollars in advertising in newspapers and national magazines, creating a demand for our products here. It is but a question of accepting and taking advantage of the markets that are opening and which will continue to grow as time goes on.

Will Linn county berries and fruit products become as famous as Sunkist oranges or other nationally famous products? Grow more fruit and vegetables and see.

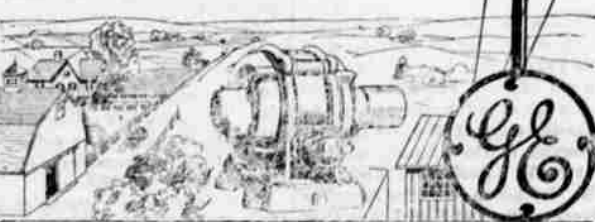
