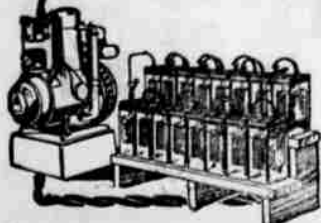

FRENCH REWARD BRAVE UNITS OF THIRD DIVISION

Decorate Regimental Flag of
30th Infantry with Croix
de Guerre with Palm

This is the reward the French gave a regiment of United States regulars who made the name Chateau-Thierry immortal in American history.

On the regimental flag of the 30th Infantry 3rd Division, near Meuse, there hangs today the Croix de Guerre with palm—tribute of the 28th French Army Corps for the magnificent work of the 30th Infantry (Chateau-Thierry) the night of July 18-19.

In addition, Col. E. L. Harris, who commanded the 30th that night in the Bois d'Amont, was given the Croix de Guerre. Colonel Perry is now in command. Three men also were given the French war cross. Maj. Gen. Joseph T. Dickman, former commander of the 3d Division and now commander of the Third American Army, was present at the ceremony.

The 30th Infantry had been decorated previously, as well as the 7th Machine Gun Battalion, which was the first unit of the 3rd Division to reach the bridge at Chateau-Thierry. In the 7th, 29 decorations were awarded, five men being cited at the cross of the army.

One of the greatest rewards the American people could make to these heroes would be to oversubscribe the Victory Loan.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Muhl of Salem were in the city today on their way to visit relatives and friends at Lyons and Fox Valley.

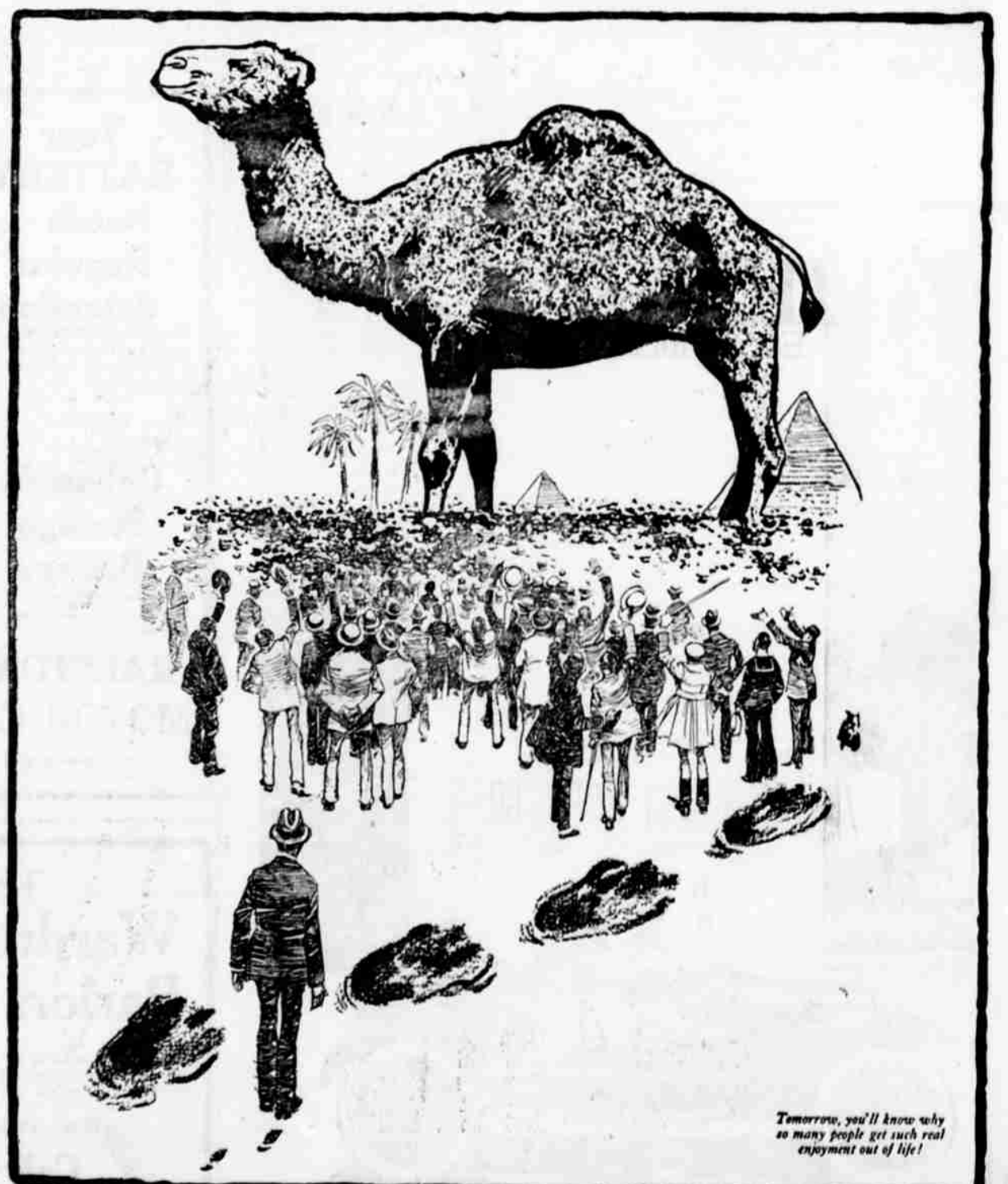
