card games and music, followed by choice refreshments served by the hostesses.

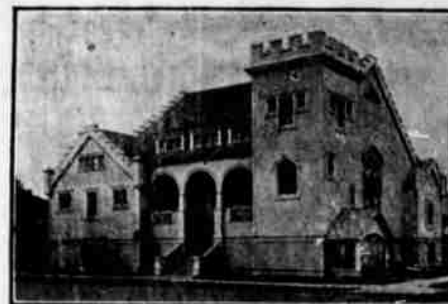
