MEMBERS TO TRAVEL

Invited to Be Guests of Stock Yards Co.; Hold Meeting in Albany

The Linn County Cooperative Livestock Shipping Association will be the guests of the Portland Union Stock Yards Company at a banquet and trip through the stock yards some day in June.

This was decided at a membership meeting of the Association at Albany on March 25.

Geo. L. Pierson, President of the Stock Yards Company and C. M. McAlister of the same company were the principal speakers. They succeeded in clearing up several misunderstandings and questions in the minds of the members present. Enemies of cooperative shipping have spread much propaganda which is intended to discredit the movement. It is often heard that the cooperative shipments are discriminated against in the yards and on the market. If this idea existed in the minds of any members present it vanished into thin air after hearing the talks by these two men.

Cooperative shipping will not down because it is based on sound economic principles. Its growth during the past ten years has been phenomenal. The Linn County Association has shipped 42 cars since August 1918 when it began business. It now has over 200 members and is growing constantly.
