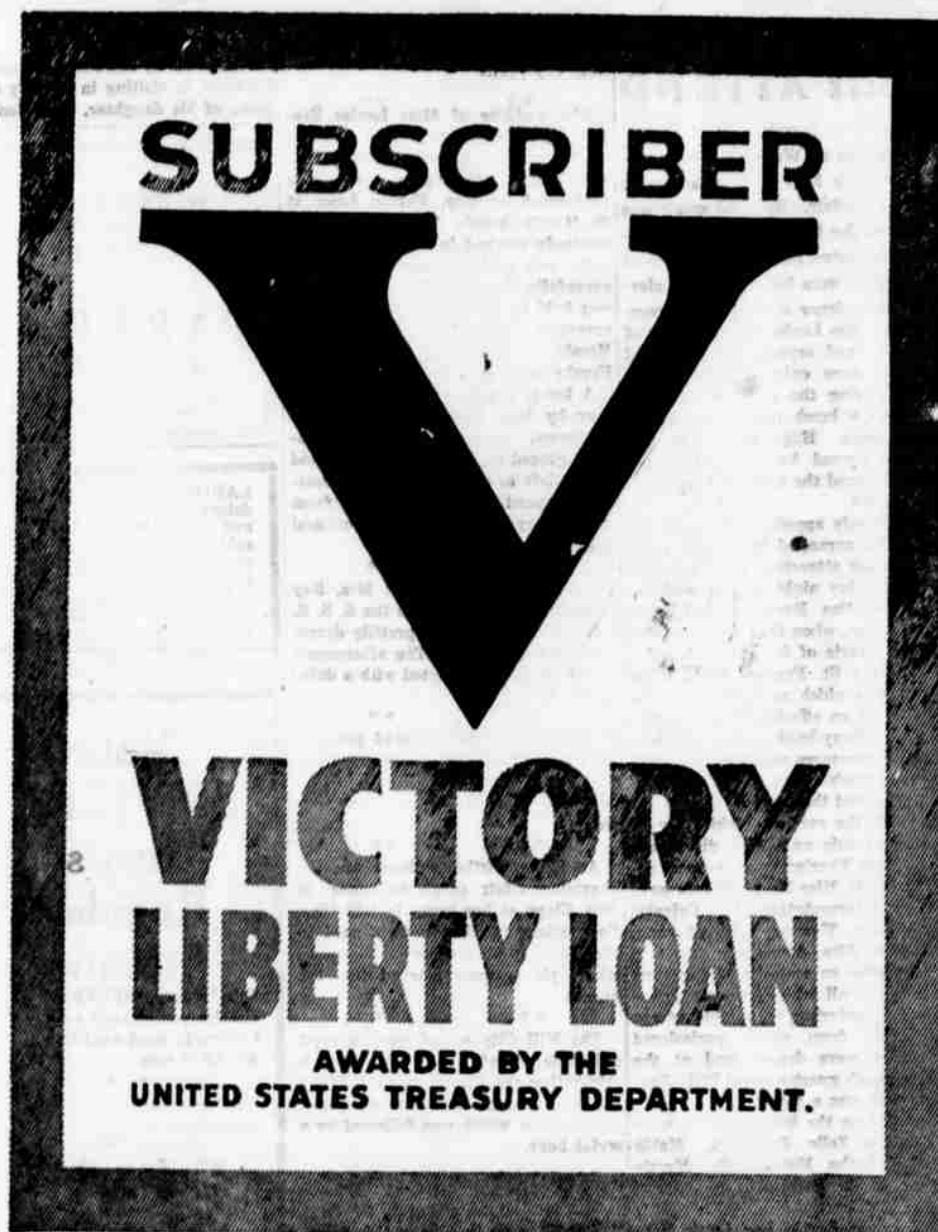


THIS EMBLEM IN EVERY HOME
