ANNUAL SCHOLARSHIPS WILL BE ISSUED TO HIGH SCHOOLS OF THE STATE

The committee on scholarships of the independent colleges of Oregon met last week in Portland and finished arrangements for the issuance of the annual joint scholarships to the accredited high schools of the state. President Wallace H. Lee of Albany college is the chairman of this committee, and he has been busy printing and sending out these certificates. The work has just been accomplished, and have gone out to all the high schools entitled to receive them.

They go out in the name of Albany, McMinnville, Pacific College, Pacific University and Philomath. The other two colleges of the conference, Reed and Willamette, prefer to go alone. Reed issues no free scholarships at all, and Willamette issues them independent of the others. The action of Willamette is creating some friction among the other colleges, and it is hoped that she will come into the joint movement after this year.

The basis on which these scholarships are conferred is very much like that of the Rhodes Scholarships. The colleges desire that the appointees shall be all-around students, good in intellectual, social and physical lines, and high in character. Popularity among their fellows counts among the points of eligibility. The decision of the principal and teachers of each respective high school. The scholar is selected by them, with reference to these items of eligibility.

The scholarship is wholly a tuition scholarship, paying for tuition only, and lasts one year. It is not transferable, and not good for any other year than the one next following after its conference, unless some private arrangement is made with each college. They are subject to the rules made by each college. The scholarship is good for any one of the five colleges offering it, and the choice of the college rests upon the one chosen by the high school.
