FOREIGN LANGUAGE PATRIOTS

The other day there gathered in the New York Hippodrome \$5,000 people chosen from 29 racial groups and 42 nationalities, represented in the New York banking district. They met not to ask anything from the United States, but to pledge their support to the forthcoming Victory Loan. How well they did it may be seen from the following figures:

At the conclusion of the meeting it was announced that the men and women there assembled had pledged subscriptions amounting to \$430,000,000, with several racial groups still to be heard from. These pledges were not mere airy promises or estimates. In most cases they were based on actual canvasses or inquiries conducted among the people represented.

The Russian division pledged \$15,000,000, representing 18,000 individual subscribers; the German division \$250,000,000, representing about 500,000 subscribers; the Hungarian division \$15,000,000, representing 50,000 subscribers; the Belgian division \$7,500,000, representing 5,000 subscribers. And so it went all through the long list of immigrant nationalities, with \$60,000,000 for the Italians and \$75,000,000 for the Poles and \$200,000 for the Finns and \$400,000 for the Lithuanians and something for all the rest.

They called it an "Americans All" rally. That was a delicious name for it. Such people are good Americans no matter to what country they once owed allegiance. Their meeting was a reminder of the big and loyal part that our 'foreign language' citizens have played throughout the war, and a challenge to native Americans to do as well as they in the new loan that is needed to clean up the war.

In many cases these memorials will be trees, sometimes a tree for every fallen hero in the class, sometimes only a single tree or small group of trees standing for all the names on the Honor Roll.

The American Forestry association especially favors this form of memorial as a part of the general work of stimulating interest in our native trees and the need for replenishing our depleted forests and beautifying our highways and public and private grounds. The association is offering to register every such memorial tree planted. A marker for designation these trees and a certificate of registration may be had upon application. The association is anxious to keep a record of the planting done.

The setting out of memorial trees is a fine thing. Few monuments are more beautiful or more lastingly appreciated than these living, growing, graceful trees. The many communities and institutions that have embarked upon a tree-planting policy are to be congratulated on their good sense and good taste, and some day they will be much envied for their good trees.
