SANTIAM SPUD GROWERS FORM ASSOCIATION FOR THEIR MUTUAL BENEFIT

Profr Geo. R. Hyslop of O. A. C. and County Agriculturist S. V. Smith were the principal speakers at a well-attended and profitable meeting of the potato growers of the Santiam section held at Crabtree last night. A similar meeting was held at Lebanon a week ago last night with good results. Prof. Hyslop specialized in his address on the growing of the potato and establishing a standard product and organizing a plan of marketing the same. It was the sense of the meeting that a permanent organization be formed and a committee on bylaws and constitution was selected to report next week.

The association is to be known as the Santiam Valley Potato Growers' association and is to include the territory between Waterloo and Thomas station. Other localities along the Willamette may be organized at a later date.
