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CHRISTIANITY HAS STOOD HARD TESTS

Pagan Bolshevism Led by Ignorant People Demonstrates Unfitness

Christianity under the stress of centuries of criticism and persecution has not broken down, and after four years of ruthless war Christianity stands the test.

Christian America forgets selfish ambition and freely gives millions to feed and clothe the starving Belgium, France and Armenia.

Christian America forgets selfish ambition and sends her youth to battle and die for the emancipation of mankind, but without recompense or indemnity.

Christian America forgets selfish ambition and lays down fourteen righteous principles as the basis for world peace and the preservation of civilization, and the world accepts these principles.

Christian America forgets selfishness and revenge and remembers the law of Christ, "Thy enemy hunger feed him." And forthwith feeds Germany and Russia despite their crimes against civilization.

Christian America enforces righteous laws by holding anarchy in check here at home, and endeavors to quell the evil elements, while protecting the weak and oppressed.

Christianity has not broken down. Christian America enforces Christian principles in standing firm square for the laborer, in the international peace conference.

So the League of Nations declares to secure and maintain fair and humane conditions for laboring men, women and children. Fair wages, an eight hour law and one day of rest in seven, and the abolition of child labor are among its aims.

Mandates must guarantee helpless peoples freedom of conscience and religion, must maintain public order and morals, and prohibit traffic in slaves, war materials and intoxicating liquors.

Under the League of Nations the Red Cross will improve public health, prevent diseases, and mitigate suffering through the world.

And yet some tell us that Christianity has failed and the world is growing worse.

Pagan Bolshevism seeks to overthrow Christianity, the Church, and Democracy; and seeks to destroy all classes of people except the one class of common laborers; seeks to overthrow public schools and education, and place common laborers without knowledge or experience at the head of schools, industries and governments.

Anarchy, whether under the guise of socialism, communism or bolshevism, has demonstrated its utter folly and failure, while Christianity rings true and stands the test.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Americans

who served in the armies of our allies and were disabled thereby, and who under the rehabilitation act of the United States Government are at present barred from receiving vocational training, may now receive the same reeducation and placement as the disabled soldiers, sailors and marines of the United States Government. More than twenty thousand young Americans enlisted in the Canadian, French and English armies, and many of them sustained injuries which have permanently disabled them, and until now they have not been able to receive the benefits of the Federal rehabilitation law. They are enabled to do so now on account of the fund of \$150,000 advanced by the Benevolent and Protective order of Elks to the

Federal Board for Vocational Training, which is the agent in charge through which the government accomplishes the reeducation of these disabled men.

In addition, men of the United States forces who were injured by accident, or otherwise, while in the service previous to October 8, 1917, will be cared for under this arrangement, and the Federal Board for Vocational Education at Washington is now endeavoring to locate men of both of these classes in need of retraining in order to make them efficient for civil life again, and will welcome information leading to this end.

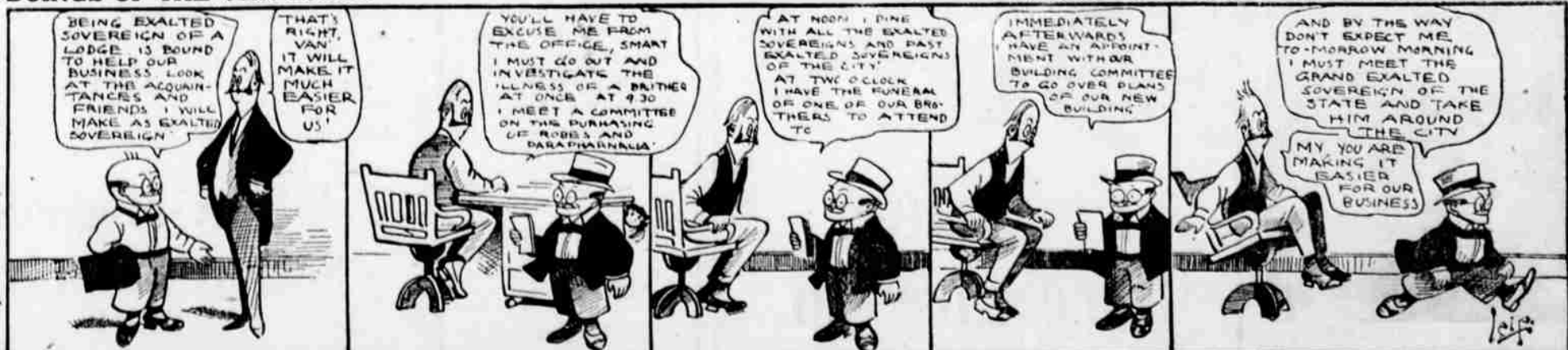
