ITALIANS AND THE LOAN

Many Italians in this country are said to have refused to buy Victory Loan bonds because of the American refusal to let Italy have Fiume. Quite aside from the merits of the territorial dispute, this was an absurd thing to do, because the United States at the time was still engaged in helping to finance Italy.

American loans advanced Italy, during and since the war, had amounted to more than \$1,500,000,000, far more than all the Liberty Bond subscriptions of Italians in this country in all the loans taken together. And an additional \$50,000,000 was advanced to the Italian government after the Italian delegation had left the peace conference.

That was conclusive proof of the basic good will and confidence of the United States regarding Italy, and of the fact that the American position throughout this controversy has been based purely on abstract principles without any prejudice against Italy or any desire to harm that country.

Now that the affair is being amicably settled, no doubt these over-zealous Italians will see the Victory Loan in a more favorable light.

If, as reported, the German men ask for soap and the German women ask for candy, it reverses all current notions on the question of relative cleanliness.

\$88 WORTH OF IGNORANCE

Probably 75 per cent of the people who took part in anarchistic parades on May Day did it because they knew no better. For instance, in the pocket of one foreigner arrested in one of the large cities was found a check for his pay as an employee in one of the big factories for the two weeks preceding the demonstration. The check was for \$88.

That man is probably a skillful workman who speaks little if any English. He cannot understand either the meaning of Americanism or the opportunities it offers, because he can neither read nor speak our language. His very prosperity may have inflamed him with false visions of available wealth.

If that man hears in his own tongue that he is abused, that instead of receiving, as he thought, a remarkably high wage, he is being syste-

matically robbed of what is rightfully his, he knows no better than to believe it. If he hears in the language which he does understand that \$88 is only a drop in the bucket compared to what he can and will have if he goes out into the streets and tears things up, he knows no better than to go.

The thing to do with that man and a thousand like him is to educate him.

But the leaders who incite such men to anarchy and revolution should be imprisoned or deported. They know better.

The Italians have been landing troops in Fiume and Dalmatia, saying that "possession is nine points of the law," and quite overlooking the fact that there are 14 points altogether.
