HOME-MAKING NOT SO EASY

Many a time have I said to a maid: 'Had you gone to kindergarten you would never have piled your dishes and saucers like that.' It was at a kindergarten conference in California, you may recall, where it was said that no convicted criminal in that state had had kindergarten training. Besides their uncertain help in the homes of others think how wanting in their own homes--when they get them--these young factory girls will be--unless they pick up considerably more knowledge about domestic ways and means."
