ates Jason T. Anderson, a son, administrator. Probable value of Linn county property, \$4,000. In addition there is some property in Grant County.

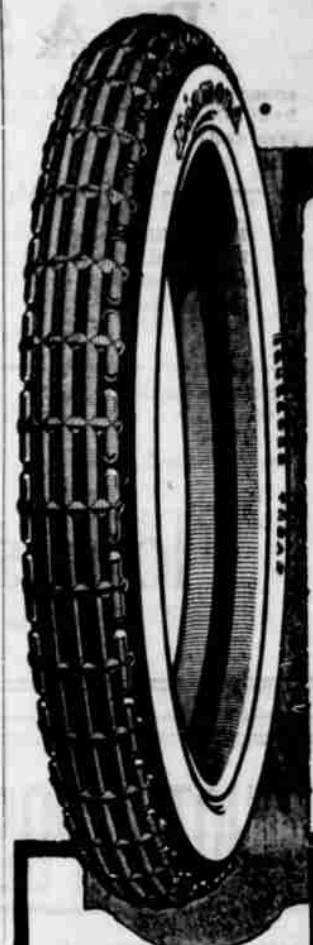

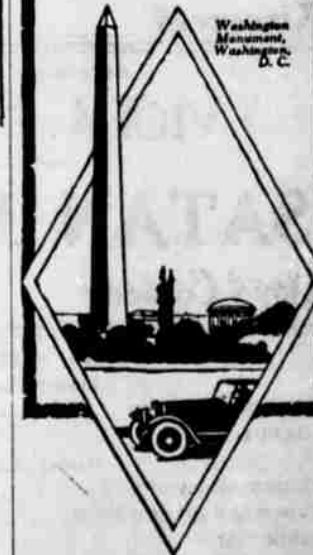
