THE VETERANS OF THE CIVIL WAR

Decorations Day is a day of many meanings this year. We include in its celebration the heroes of a good many wars, but there is one set of living survivors of one of these wars that should have a goodly portion of our thought and respect. It is the little remnant left of the G. A. R. and the Confederate Veterans.

The war in which these old men fought was a good many years ago. Their triumphs and sufferings are less fresh in our minds than those of our young heroes. But none the less, it was a great war which they fought, and a bloody one, and a useful one.
