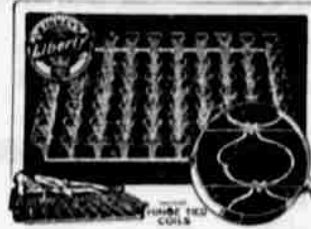

ALBANY MAN ON MOTORSHIP WRITES FROM MOROCCO PORT

The following letter has been received by Mrs. L. A. Wood of 516 Elm street from her son, Charles, who is first engineer on the motorship Diria. The letter is dated at Fideila, Morocco, on the north coast of Africa, Apr. 24. He says in part:

"We arrived here last night at 5:50, after a 24 day and ten hour run from Staten Island, N. Y. This is certainly a great old place. The country is quite fertile along the coast and has a few scattering villages and forts. It is only a narrow strip and the Sahara Desert is on the other side. The town where we are lying has about 1000 houses. There is a breakwater that makes a small harbor but we have to lay outside.

It is cool here so far. A good breeze all the time. Of course in the sun it is hot, if the wind does not strike you.

I guess we are the first vessel that has been here for a long time. I really don't see the excuse for a town, anyway. There are a number of tombs along the coast. Some of them are large ones. The natives are a measly bunch. Some wear turbans and some wear the native fez. It is a red skullcap with a short tassel. It is made of felt. Part of them have a skirt and red sash. The skirt is sewed up at each side to make a leg and then across the bottom. They come just below the knees and the bag in the seat gives them a ridiculous appearance. All the turbaned bunch have short black whiskers, while the others are smooth shaved.

I hope to take a trip to Casa Blanca Sunday. That is a native village 13

miles down the coast.

I suppose in a year or two the letters you sent here will be coming back. We caught a turtle and a porpoise on the way over. The porpoise is still hanging in the rigging. The meat is a little dry now but not bad. We have a few flies but no mosquitoes yet.

I don't know whether we will go to Marseilles or not. I hope we do.
