FARMER SUPREME IN CHINA

Tiller of the Soil Lives Circumscribed Life, and is Satisfied With a Bare Existence.

In recognition of the importance of Chinese agriculture the emperor himself, in the days of the empire, followed the wise custom of turning a furrow of ground once a year in the sacred precincts of the Temple of Heaven at Peking. It is the farmer still who is the true representative of Chinese society and the farmer's baby who carries on the tradition in its soundest aspects. His life as he grows up may be narrowly circumscribed by the mud walls of his humble thatched home, which he shares indifferently with the pigs and live stock; the rise and fall of dynasties or republics trouble him not at all. If the year passes with no devastating floods, wrecking the results of many months' labor, food will be sufficient; no more can be asked. Now and then striding actors come through the village and set up their grass-mat theaters; a story-teller makes his appearance at the temple festival, recounting the strangely living deeds of miraculous beings in centuries long since harvested; itinerant traders, their wares on their backs, pass down the deep-sunken road, bringing the gossip of the outer world. If life is lived according to the irreducible denominator it is not wholly barren. There is the vast accumulated thought of the past, the immeasurable world of the countless dead, toward which the present reaches out like a ring ever widening toward eternity.--Asia Magazine.

Color Blindness.

Color blindness proves to be less simple than has been supposed, the defect being one of coloring instead of vision in some cases. As reported by Dr. H. E. Howe of the American Chemical society, eyes quite perfect in ordinary color perception have become weak or fatigued for red and then have responded to the green ray combined with the red from certain red glass. A veteran engine driver properly identified red light near at hand, while at considerable distance the signal appeared green. The disc of the lamp was found to be copper ruby glass and this and some other kinds of red glass permit rays toward the blue end of the spectrum to pass in mixture with the red. The use of selenium ruby glass is advised, its transmission of only red rays insuring that the normal eye will see no green.

Peculiar Patches in Sky.

Not less than 182 more or less clearly defined dark patches in the sky are recognized by Prof. E. E. Barnard in his latest catalogue. In some cases they are fairly round and regular, in others they are of complicated and contorted form and their appearance and sharpness suggest that they are dark clouds or nebulae cutting off a background made faintly luminous by unseen stars or diffused nebulous matter. Most, though not all, of the dark patches are in the region of the Milky Way, where so much of the material visible in the heavens is contained.

The Season's Russian Blouse Suits



Never a season is ushered in without a few models in suits made along the lines of the Russian blouse, and never do these suits go unconsidered. There is just one explanation for this state of things and that is the becomingness of this particular style and its "class." There are certain types of women, including those with slender figures, that are wedded to the Russian blouse because they are wise enough to choose the thing they look best in; and there are other types that cannot wear it.

The Russian blouse is represented this season by suits more or less like that shown at the left of the two pictures above. This particular suit follows the original Russian blouse--its source of inspiration--at considerable distance owing to modifications that reveal its speaking acquaintance with new features in spring styles. But the flavor is there plain enough. The skirt is long and narrow, and this is the kind of skirt that looks best with the blouse. Whenever the narrow skirt comes in the blouse is sure to follow. In this case it has an overlapped seam at one side that is split up from the bottom and finished with buttons and buttonholes. It can be unfastened to give plenty of freedom in walking. The blouse takes note of current styles in sleeves that flare slightly and

adopts a shawl collar that widens slightly at the back. It takes further liberties in the addition of a vestee and collar of figured satin, and vindicates its conduct by its attractiveness.

In the suit at the right the fancy of the designer is not hampered by any attempt to follow a definite type. Having disposed of the skirt by making it according to rule--long, narrow and plain--he spent his energies on the coat, which is a fanciful affair that puts this suit in a class where it has no many rivals. It has a collar and vest of striped tricotette and curious but much admired strap effects at the side that turn up at the bottom and end on the coat in large bone buttons.
