And a statement of the facts relating to the proposed offer to dispose of it to the city of Albany

Statement by L. M. Curl

This question is not new to the people of Albany. Whether there is an acceptance of the proposition that has been made, depends upon the public mind and public action. I had heretofore determined that I would keep "hands off," if the proposal were fairly presented to the people. That is, it was my opinion that the exact terms of the proposition should be known, that the people should do their own reasoning and act without interference. However, so many stories have come to me of the manner of bringing the proposal to the attention of the people, that I deem it proper to make a statement.

I may say that the same people who have heretofore been so active and enthusiastic in support of the proposition have been and are now in the same unfair way that characterized their efforts heretofore, trying to influence the public mind. The statements that are being made misrepresent the facts. This may be due to overzealousness, or in some cases it may be intentional; but to be just to everybody we will say that it is unintentional.

Nevertheless, the statements are false, and have caused many well-meaning citizens to change their mind concerning the matter. In order that there may be no misunderstanding as to what I refer, I will state plainly that it has reached me many times, that certain persons who have been most actively supporting the proposition have stated that an offer as made in 1914 has been short of the conditions imposed at that time and that it is now a proposal to offer it to the city without conditions. I could scarcely believe that any person possessed of a normal mind, could or would make that kind of a statement, because it is wholly false. I made an investigation and I found that men who are ordinarily supposed to be reputable are actually spreading such statements broadcast. It has been proven to me by some of my close personal friends who voted against the proposition before, but who expressed an intention to sup-

port it this time because they believed that the statements made to them to the effect that the conditions have been removed. Even though I knew these things, I could scarcely believe it. The truth is that not a single one of these conditions have been removed. They all appear in the present offer, some of them with a slight modification of the phraseology. Since this matter has come to be a matter of veracity, I shall not ask the people of Albany to accept any statement I may make but will give reference to the records in

support of what I say.

In order that the facts as they appeared in the previous offer and as they appear in the present offer may be known to the public I refer the people to the proffered deed as it was made in 1914 and the deed that is now in escrow in the bank awaiting a decision by the people. As many of the readers of the papers will not have the facts before them I will ask them to refer to the pamphlet mailed to the voters of the city by the City Recorder.

I am sorry I have not before me the conditions that were in the former deed but they may be seen at the recorder's office by request. Now to show that I am not exaggerating my statement, that false statements are being made to the public, I am inserting herein an exact copy of a portion of an article published in both of the evening papers of Albany on June 5, 1919.
