Notice To Irrigation Water Users

In order to provide the most satisfactory water service to users, irrigation will be permitted on alternate days. The houses with odd numbers, or the houses located on the East and North sides of the street, will irrigate on the odd numbered days of the calendar month; the houses with even numbers, or the houses on the South and West sides of the street, will irrigate on the even numbered days of the calendar month; provided that when there are 31 days in any calendar month, all water users will be allowed to use water for lawn sprinkling and irrigating purposes on the 31st day thereof, excepting those who have violated the foregoing requirements made in the best interest of all concerned.

Irrigation hours are from 6 a. m. to 10 a. m. and from 5 p. m. to 9 p. m.
