Can Transport Booze

According to a decision recently made by the U. S. supreme court, it is lawful to carry liquors in baggage through dry states on interstate trips. The decision states that prohibition officers have no right to board trains in dry territory and search baggage for booze.

The Public Service Commission will hold a hearing in Portland June 12 in the matter of prescribing and fixing fees for inspecting, grading and weighing hay, grain, potatoes, onions, etc., and establishing standard grades in conformity with standards fixed by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture.

WORD IS RECEIVED FROM W.G. ABRAHAM

Sons Receive Message Thru Red Cross After Silence of 2 1/2 Years

After more than two and one-half years without a word from their father, Dick, Gus and Alfred Abraham have received word through the Red Cross that he is in good health and is living at Kiel, Germany.

W. G. Abraham went to Germany seven years ago to spend several months visiting relatives. He has one brother and many other relatives in his native land. In 1914 the world war broke out. The seas were blockaded by the French and British fleets and he had no way of getting back to America. Then America entered the war and he was cut off from news from home.

The ten-word cablegram from a Miss Lewis, of the Red Cross in the zone of occupation, states that Mr. Abraham and Gus Binding, who left for Germany 12 years ago, would return as soon as they can get passports. Mr. Abraham is 75 years old and Binding is about 55.

Binding went to Germany with the intention of investing his money in his sister's estate, which is located near Kiel, the important city in Poland which is the center of much discussion around the peace table. Danzig has been awarded to Poland and Binding has lost all of the money he invested. The same thing happened when Germany took over Schleswig-Holstein from Denmark. Many residents of that country held Danish government bonds, but they were never redeemed.

The old Abraham estate is near Kiel. The Kiel canal runs through the property, which is still intact after many generations of ownership.

Mr. Abraham came to America about 40 years ago and resided near Albany in Benton county most of the time since then. He has raised a large family and seven years ago decided that he wanted to see the old country once more and went back on a visit. He was in Germany at the time of the Franco-Prussian War in 1871, having likewise gone on a visit at that time and was declared while he was in Europe. He was on the first German blockade runner as a passenger, and his ship reached port after being chased for four hours by the French fleet. That war lasted only about eight months. Prussia crushing France with its military system then as it thought it could do in the recent war.
