ENGLAND AND AMERICA

Speaking of Americans, the London World remarks: "By now there is not one of the European countries that they have overrun—and they are established in the remotest corners—where the Americans as a whole have not become intensely unpopular. France and Italy are more than 'fed up' with them. And the reason, I imagine, or one of the chief reasons, is that they are an inferior nation."

"The arrogance of the aristocrat is detestable. But the arrogance of the mere plutocrat is unbearable. And after all, it is on wealth, at bottom, that America depends for her influence. As a race the Americans are, as they might put it, all-sorts-of-Darwins. Their kinship with us is of the

remotest."

And so it goes, to the end of a long and unheartening tirade.

Now, there are Americans who, seeing such stuff as this in print, credited to a newspaper which they take to be typically English, will say: "You see! That is what the British people really think of us. And that is what the Europeans in general think of us. That is what we get for all our generosity and sacrifice."

"From some of the other nations we should not expect much. But from the English, with whom we have so much in common, with whom we have renewed our old ties of friendship and from whom we have expected real understanding, it comes hard."

But those who take the matter so seriously quite fail to appreciate the fact that the utterance does not repre-

sent the opinion of the London editor for America may be matched the opinion of at least one of the editors for America.

It may be doubted, indeed, whether in the whole British press, past or present, there can be found such bitter and contemptuous statements about America as have been appearing for years in some yellow and jingoistic American publications. And no well-informed man will maintain that they represent real American sentiment.

Let no American be deceived by this sort of twaddle. The two nations have a greater natural regard for each other than they have had for 150 years. And this is an excellent thing for both of them and for the whole world, because, whatever the degree of bloodmixture, they are of the same language, traditions and culture, and constitute twin branches of the dominant race that seems destined to inherit the earth.

THE GIST OF THE LEAGUE

Discussion of the League of Nations lately seems to be confusing the issue rather than clarifying it. It is well to get back to the simple aim which was the inspiration of the effort to form a league, and which many competent observers in many countries believe will be attained by the present plan. Sir John Foster Fraser, an English journalist now in this country, puts the gist of it in these few words:

"The League may not stop war altogether, but it will delay and discourage war. If there had been such a League in 1914 I am sure the world war would never have been started."

He adds a remark that is particularly true of current comment in the United States: "Prejudices in the guise of principles are governing the conduct of some people who criticize the League."

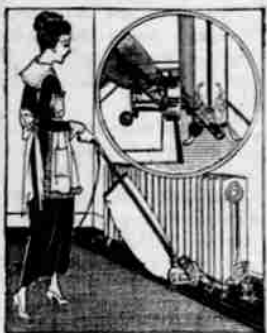

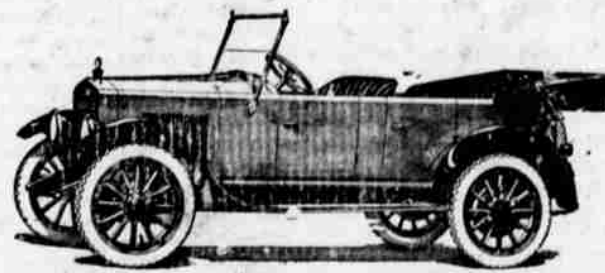
