Two New Arrivals in Blouses



The new arrivals in blouses are not very different from the models introduced at the beginning of the season, but they show little, original touches in the details of finishing that make them interesting. The only new departure in the styles is heralded by a few very rich blouses, made of two or three kinds of lace, very skillfully combined, or of lace with fine embroidered batiste. Fine flat, hand-made val and cluny laces, with the heavier braid laces joined to them by lace stitches, look very much like the work of the French and are late arrivals in the displays that will captivate many admirers of fine work. They are very expensive and only practical for women who can afford to be extravagant.

However superb these new lace blouses may be, they detract nothing from the charm of dainty and far less costly blouses of gossamer crepe. They flourish side by side and youthfulness abides with the neogettes. Two of these are pictured here, modeled on lines that have grown familiar, but the blouse at the left displays thread embroidery so placed that it is unusual. It outlines the neck, apron and sleeves but runs into panels at each side that are extended to the bust line. Another pretty and novel feature of this blouse

is the folded ribbon girdle. Made in dark colors to match tailored suits and worn over camisoles of wide ribbon, in figured patterns and strong colors, this blouse will prove a joy. The blouse at the right depends upon an eccentric sleeve and a turnover collar that is cut in sections for the novelty of design that gives it character. The embroidery is put on to form panels and the tiniest buttons, set on the tab in the sleeve above its cuff, proclaim this the last word in blouses.
