Swimming parties have been in vogue during the warmer days, many going to Bryant Island, enjoying a dip in the Willamette and later a picnic supper around a big bonfire.

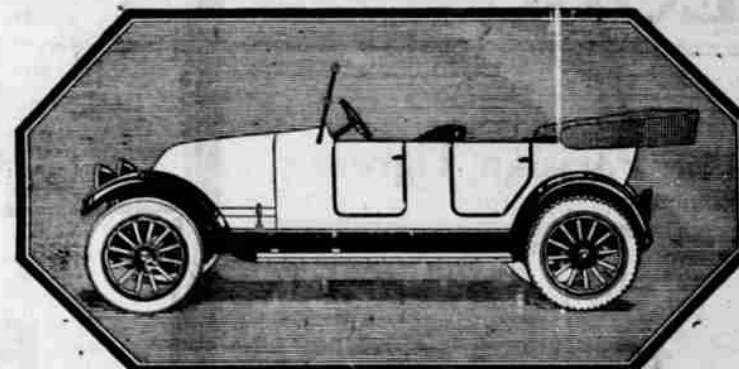

How the amount of change from a \$5 bill converted the owner of a heavy, powerful car to Franklin ownership
