## EIGHT ARE KILLED IN COLLISION ON NEW YORK CENTRAL 15 OTHERS INJURED

**Train Standing at Station Is  
Hit by Approaching  
Passenger Engine, Which  
Fails to Respond to Brakes**

## BOILER EXPLODES

**20 Persons Injured When  
Naval Dirigible Explodes  
While Moored at Camp  
Holabird**

DUNKIRK, N. Y., July 1.—U. P.—Eight were killed and 15 injured early today in a rear-end collision of New York Central passenger trains at Dunkirk station. One train was standing at the station, delayed by a hotbox. The flagman attempted to stop the other train, which was known to be approaching. The airbrakes failed to hold, and the great miked locomotive plowed into the rear coach of the standing train. The first crash was heard throughout the surrounding country; and almost instantly the explosion of the second locomotive's boiler followed.

**Naval Balloon Explodes**  
BALTIMORE, July 1.—A score of persons were injured today when the naval dirigible C-8 exploded while moored at Camp Holabird, near here. The explosion is said to have been caused by a leak in the huge gas bag. The explosion's shock was felt in far sections of the city.

## NEW CANNERY IS SHIPPING FINE FRUIT

The Linn-Benton Fruit Association in addition to constructing one of the best modern cannery buildings in the valley is taking in as a starter about five tons of loganberries per day at five cents per pound. The season has just begun to open on this product and will be flush in a few days. The berries are being placed in barrels of 500 pounds each and sent to Portland to be placed in cold storage. The cannery is also shipping about 125 cases per day of cherries to Summer for preparation for the market. The producer is being paid from five to eight cents a pound, according to quality. Raspberries bring ten cents wholesale with not enough to in any way supply the demand. There is a large number of farmers talking small fruits for the cannery and with proper cooperation the company expects great development in this line during the next few years. Manager W. R. Scott went to Portland yesterday in the interest of the cannery and is expected to return this evening.

## INSISTS EX-CROWN PRINCE ESCAPED

**New Report Says Son of  
Kaiser Left Island of  
Wierengen**

BRUSSELS, July 1.—U. P.—A dispatch today says the former German Crown Prince has escaped from the island of Wierengen, where he had been interned.

Paris dispatches Thursday reported that he had escaped, but the Dutch government officially denied this the following day.

**Hamburg Is Occupied**  
LONDON, July 1.—A Copenhagen dispatch today reported that Gen. von Lettow's government troops occupied Hamburg without opposition. Riots had recently occurred there.

## PENSIONS GRANTED TO INDIAN FIGHTERS

Pensions were granted within the past week to Robert D. Hodges of this city and Malcom S. Monteith, formerly of Albany but now living in Portland. These men were both members of the Linn county Rifles, a mounted company of the Oregon militia that crossed the mountains from Albany in June, 1878, to assist in quelling an Indian invasion headed by Buffalo Horn, who was one of Gen. Howard's scouts during the Nez Perce war. The command was in service 52 days.

## LOCAL TELEPHONE LINEMEN ARE OUT

**Five Union Men Join Striking  
Operators; North-  
west Cities Tied Up**

Albany is today feeling the strike of the telephone operators and linemen, which has almost tied up the entire service at Portland, Tacoma and Seattle. Although satisfied with the new schedule offered by the company, the five linemen and wiremen here were compelled to obey the strike, which was ordered by the national organization.

The strike is really in sympathy with the telephone operators, explained A. B. Coates, local wire chief. No trouble is expected, and it is believed that the entire difficulty will be satisfactorily straightened out. The local telephone operators are not organized and are not expected to join the striking sisters in the larger cities.

The new wage schedule gives the girls a minimum of \$12 a week for beginners with higher salaries for more experienced operators. Common linemen are to get \$6 a day, while others get higher salaries with construction foremen drawing \$175 per month.

## Portland Operators Out

PORTLAND, July 1.—Electrical workers employed by the Pacific Telephone company voted early today to strike throughout the state, joining the walkout of the Portland hellogirls. Union leaders say that all of the 400 Oregon telephone electrical workers are out; that five hundred of the nine hundred operators here are striking.

The company maintains a very slow service. Both sides claim gains.

## Seattle Service Crippled

SEATTLE, July 1.—Telephone service is almost completely stopped by the strike of operators and electrical workers.

## Captain Powell Here—

## CHICAGO AND NEW YORK CONTINUE TO SELL BEER, LIGHT WINE DESPITE ACT

**Attorney General Palmer  
Declares Dealers Who  
Continue to Sell 2.75 Per  
Cent Beer Are Liable**

## NO EARLY ACTION

**Congress Not Apt to Pass  
Legislation Before Aug. 1;  
Judge Rose Sustains De-  
murrer to Brewing Co.**

WASHINGTON, July 1.—U. P.—“Dealers who continue to sell beer are in danger of arrest and prosecution,” Attorney General Palmer declared today. He said he had not authorized the sale of 2.75 per cent beer. Reports show that beer and in some instances light wines are still being sold in many cities.

Attorney General Palmer's statement regarding the dry law enforcement brought from congressional leaders here today the prediction that unless unusual conditions arise, prohibition enforcement legislation will not be passed earlier than August 1. Republican Leader Mendell stated that the drastic terms of constitutional prohibition, coupled with wartime enforcement provisions in the same bill, will require careful consideration.

**Brewers' Demurrer Sustained**  
BALTIMORE, July 1.—Judge Rose in the United States district court here today sustained the demurrer of the Standard Brewing Co. to the indictment by the government for manufacturing 2.75 per cent beer. This decision may mean the legal sale of such beer.

## GREAT DESTRUCTION CAUSED BY QUAKE WHICH SHAKES ALL OF NORTHERN ITALY

**Many Villages Razed, 20  
Partially Wiped Out by  
Shock Which Continues  
All Morning**

## MANY ARE KILLED

**Vicchio Almost Completely  
Wiped Out and 40 Are  
Killed; Miralond Razed  
and People Buried**

ROME, July 1.—By United Press.—The terrible earth-tremor which gripped Northern Italy 24 hours ago continued its convulsions until early this morning. Many villages have fallen upon themselves and have been razed by their own fires. All are partially ruined.

At what was once the town of Vicchio 40 Italians were killed in the swift destruction.

A large part of the inhabitants of the little community of Miralond lies beneath the ruins of the homes.

Only meagre news is available here today, owing to the dislocation of communication. But the destruction was sanguine at Olmi, Rabatta and Casaglia. And Florence, the ancient city of art, reports many casualties.

## CAR OF TROUT FRY TO ARRIVE TONIGHT

**Santiam Streams to Be Re-  
stocked; Warden to In-  
spect Hatchery Site**

A carload of cutthroat trout fry will arrive at Lebanon tonight from the Bonneville fish hatchery for distribution in small streams flowing into the Santiam above Cascade. The young fish are being brought through the efforts of the Santiam Fish and Game Propagative and Protective association.

Judge L. G. Lewelling, president, and Dr. J. G. Gill, of Lebanon, vice-president of the association, will accompany Forest Supervisor C. C. Hall and his rangers tomorrow and assist in the planting of the fry. The fish will be planted in the small streams and next season they will make their way down to the main river.

Within the next 30 days a car will be received for restocking the North Santiam and another car for the lakes in eastern Linn county. The local association is proving itself worthy of the task it has undertaken and is getting results for the local sportsmen.

Within the next few days Master Fish Warden R. E. Clanton and the entire fish and game commission will arrive in Albany and from here visit several sites that are in prospect for a fish hatchery on the Santiam. The legislature made provisions for the location of more hatcheries and one was recently located on the MacKenzie river above Eugene. It is not known where the hatchery will be located in this section.

All chance for the location of a game farm in Linn county this year went glimmering last week when the game commission, for which Gene Simpson was acting, selected a site four miles from Eugene. Linn county lost out largely through insulating upon the old Denny farm, say local sportsmen. The Denny farm is said to be low land, partly under water in the winter and wholly unsuited for the raising of pheasants and game birds. No other site was shown the commission here and the project was immediately passed up.

## IS GREAT EVENT

End with Big Mardi Gras  
Carnival and Street Dance**

The finishing touches are being put on Albany's great Fourth of July Victory Celebration and Reception to returned soldiers, sailors and marines. The general committee met last night and heard reports from the various members in charge of the different departments, and decided that all is well.

Don Preston, particular live wire who is infusing more pep and vigor into the proceedings than perhaps any person, is highly pleased with the way his cohorts are working. Preston is general chairman of the celebration.

## Mardi Gras Is Feature

Chairman Preston is devoting most of his energies to helping Wayne Stuart and the dance committee make a big feature of the Mardi Gras and dance on the evening of the Fourth. The fun will begin at 9 o'clock when the grand march of the Victory ball begins in the arena which will be roped off on Ellsworth street between First and Second. The space will be well cleaned and oatmeal sprinkled on the pavement to make it fit for dancing. The Shedd band will furnish the music from a platform which will be built.

## Parade Is Novel

During the evening the Mardi Gras carnival will be a full swing and confetti, serpentine and fireworks devices will be in evidence. It will furnish a gala closing for a memorable day.

The parade, of which J. M. Hawkins is chairman, will be one of the big events of the day. The procession will move forward promptly at 10 o'clock and will be one of the greatest spectacles ever seen here. Scores of new features are being worked out and a brand new article in the parade line is promised. Capt. Albee Coates is assisting with this feature and is bringing ideas used in France and England.

## Portland Man Speaker

The parade will pass the reviewing stand at the courthouse, after which it will break up and the speaking will begin. The committee, of which P. D. Gilbert is chairman, has secured Dr. Wm. A. Waldo, pastor of the White Temple of Portland, a speaker of more than statewide renown, for principal speaker of the day. Dr. Waldo is a brilliant orator, a deep thinker and a man who will hold his audience. Other speakers will be on the program.

The baseball game between Brownsville and the Albany Athletics will be played following the parade on the Round-Up grounds.

## Barbecue At Noon

The big event for the noon hour will be the barbecue which will be held in Central Park. Meat and bread for thousands will be provided under the committee headed by Frank Pfeiffer.

From 2 to 4 o'clock the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen will stage a program on the river near the steel bridge. Log sawing, rolling and riding contests will be staged; water fights, tug-o-war and other events put on. Prizes will be offered for the winners. The committee will meet again tonight and arrange for the prizes.

## Street Events

From 4 to 5 Seth French will stage his street events, which will include races and various other attractions for the youngsters.

Both the Albany and Shedd bands will furnish music during the day and there will be something going on from morning until midnight. The Mardi Gras will end the greatest celebration ever held here.

An added attraction that has not been counted on may be the appearance here of Lieut. Krull, who was recently with the five airplanes en route to California. Lieut. Krull is scheduled to give exhibitions at Salem, Eugene and other points that day and may be secured for Albany. The local committee is working on arrangements.

## FRENCH CLEAN UP STREETS OF RUINED REIMS
