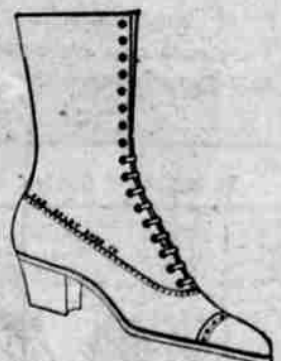

\$15,000 A YEAR

stating that for any amount up to \$5,000 a year for five years, that is raised in Albany, together with a like amount to be given by the Oregon synod, that it will put up an equal amount. This means that if \$5,000 a year is raised here, the college board will put up another \$5,000 and the Oregon Synod will add another, making \$15,000 a year for five years for the maintenance of the college.

Will Employ President This will enable it to employ a high class president who will give his entire time to the development and growth of the college. It will enable it to add more faculty members and to begin a growth that will carry it far. It means that a campaign for new buildings on the new campus west of the city will be begun.

The drive to raise this amount will be begun at once. The board of trustees has decided to give a \$50 scholarship for every \$50 subscribed. Rev. J. Edward Blair, field secretary of the college, added to Mr. Young's remarks and strongly urged the businessmen to support the college to their fullest extent. He painted a glowing picture of what the college will amount to within five years, predicting a freshman class enrollment before that time of 200 students alone.

Committee Appointed A committee composed of P. A. Young, L. E. Hamilton and A. J. VanWaning was appointed to work with the college trustees on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce.

B. C. Miller brought up the proposition of placing signs about the country advertising Albany's auto campgrounds and attracting tourist travel through the city, which is now passing it by. President Miller appointed B. C. Miller, W. V. Merrill and Owen Beam a committee to make arrangements for the signs.

The trustees of the college met at 1 o'clock today to organize for the drive and it is hoped that the entire \$5,000 will be subscribed before the meeting of the Oregon synod, which meets in Eugene next Tuesday for an eight-day session.

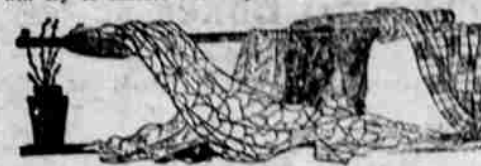

Returned from Springfield—Leonard McClain, for many years a trusted employee of the American States Power Company returned from Springfield this morning where he had been a few days in the interest of his company.

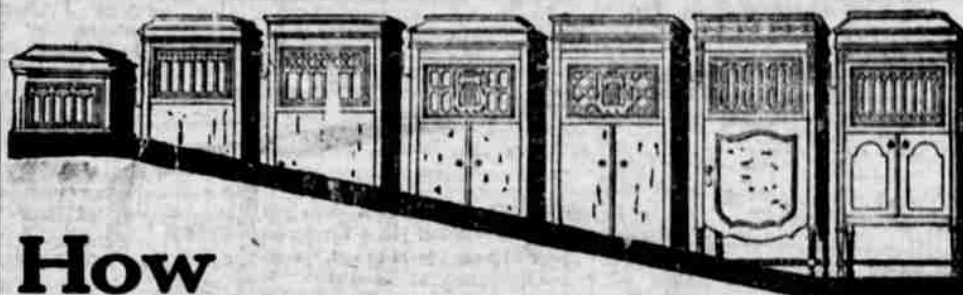
NORMA TALMADGE AS INDIAN MAID
