CRAWFORD HOLDS MANY FIRST HONORS

Whit Crawford has sold his business and since he will not have any more car sales to report he will have to get a lot of publicity while the opportunity affords. So here is another one on records held by Linn county's pioneer farmer and salesman.

He started in making records when he was the first child born to his parents after their arrival in Oregon. He was born on the farm near Lebanon, where he has continued to make his home. That was Feb. 17, 1857. In 1880 he was the first boy in the neighborhood to have a horse and buggy.

He drove the first twine binder ever brought to Oregon, about 1887 or '88.

He was one of the clerks in the election of 1884, the first year the Australian ballot system was put in use. He was the first farmer in Linn county to own a car, the first dealer in Linn county to bring a carload of cars to Albany, and he is the first automobile dealer in Linn county to retire.

MONUMENTS WILL MARK AMERICANS' WORK IN FRANCE

Verdun, June 15. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Monuments to commemorate the achievements of the Americans in the battles of the Argonne are being built details of the work being attended to by different army units.

A series of concrete monuments, adorned with German machine guns and in some instances with German helmets and rifles has been put up to mark the front line of a division advance or to tell of the capture of a certain village by some regiment. Most of the monuments are being placed in prominent places near the main roads, when possible, so that they will serve as guide posts for the Americans fought their greatest battle of French soil.

LAST OF STORES AT GO BY AUG. 1

London, June 16. (Correspondence of the Associated Press) The last of the billion dollars worth of stores purchased by the American army in England will have been disposed of on August 1 in the opinion of Major General J. C. Biddis. The American Army headquarters were closed June 15 and only a small con-

tingent of the quartermaster's department remained to co-operate with the Liquidation Commission in adjusting a few remaining contracts and selling supplies. Consequently by August the army will cease to have a war interest in England.
