SGT. FRANK MILLER HOME FROM FRANCE

Sgt. Franklin Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Miller, arrived home this morning from Camp Lewis, where he was discharged after more than two years service with the American army. "And it's good to get home," he says, "and I'm getting into civies just as soon as I possibly can."

Sgt. Miller was a student at the University of Oregon in April, 1917, and on the 5th of that month, the day before war was declared against Germany, he went to Vancouver and enlisted in his old organization, Co. M, of Salem, which was mobilized March 25th. He served at guard duty at The Alamos and LaGrande and after preliminary training at Camp Withycombe the old Third regiment was sent to Camp Mills.

The unit sailed on Dec. 11, arriving in England on Christmas Day. On New Years Day he landed at Le-Havre, France, and his company was put on guard duty at Nevers, where he was kept until after the close of the war. He is disappointed at not having been sent to the front, as the company was promised many times.

All of Mr. Miller's family is now home, his two sons-in-law, Capt. Roy Wood and Capt. Alton Coates having returned from overseas last month. Capt. Wood expects to return to France in the near future, however.

NONPARTISANS FOR THE DEFENSE COMPLETE CASE

JACKSON, July 12.—By A. P.—The defense was completed today in the case of A. C. Townley and Joseph Gilbert, nonpartisan league leaders charged with conspiracy.

The defense asked that Townley be permitted to make part of the address to the jury. Townley did not take the stand in his own behalf, however, as attorneys for the state protested against his being allowed to address the jury.

State and National Conventions to Be Held in Portland in August
