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BOOST FOR HOP PICKERS

Considerable pep has been added to the Harrisburg Bulletin since M. D. Morgan returned to the editorial helm.

In the last issue the Bulletin has started a fight for higher wages for hop pickers. He points out that a deft woman can earn as much for the grower as a strong, skilled man in the harvest fields.

A cent a pound, he says, is a beggary wage these days when one dol-

lar will hardly do the work of fifty cents in former years. Growers this year are offering from 50 to 60 cents per box. This, says the Bulletin, is not fair, especially in the fact of the fact that growers are getting higher prices than ever for their crops.

With but few hops in England, France, Germany and Austria, the world must look to America for its supply this year. It really seems the hard-working harvester deserves better pay this year in the face of existing circumstances.

son, De Goot at last was free to return to his home, only to find it abandoned and his family gone. All he could learn was that his boys had been brought to America. So now he is here, hunting for them, and has offered a reward of \$100 for information about them.

They are almost six years old now but they will not know their soldier father when he finds them. He always says "when" ever "if", when he does find them, he means to establish a home right here in America.
