### Vacation Rules

The British Minister of Education not long ago laid down some simple rules for getting the very most out of the holiday season. He was speaking especially to teachers. What he said interested other recreation seekers as well. Some of his suggestions follow:

Plan your holiday carefully, but ready to abandon your plans on the slightest provocation. A change of work is in itself a holiday.

One of the best fruits of a holiday is a new friendship. Take short cuts if you will, but remember that there is seldom time for them.

The best holiday is that which contains the largest amount of new experience. In choice of holiday books act on the principle that one of the main uses of leisure is to feed the imagination.

On occasion a very good holiday can be taken at home—if you change the hour of breakfast.

It is quite plain the British minister knows that the first big value of a holiday depends upon one's own attitude toward it. Pret and haste and greediness can spoil a vacation no matter how delightful the surroundings. A calm, cheerful spirit, awake to the interesting things all about it and willing to abandon petty worries, can make even a stay-at-home holiday a recreation, while carried to new scenes and experiences it derives the most possible out of the vacation opportunities.

### A Billion in Stamps

The postoffice department has sold so far about \$1,000,000,000 in War Savings Stamps. Thus the humble 25-cent thrift stamp has furnished about one dollar out of every 30 devoted to the war. 
