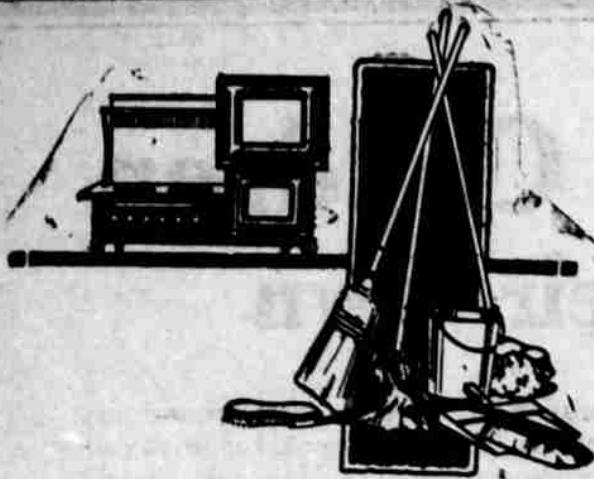

INJURIOUS CANNING DOPES

Housewives Warned Against Use of Harmful Compounds

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Special.—Canning compounds sold under various trade names for use in home canning are often harmful to health and should never be used by housewives, say specialists of the bureau of chemistry, U. S. department of agriculture. These preparations, which are usually in powdered form and contain salicylic acid or boric acid, are unnecessary since fruits and vegetables can be kept for long periods in perfect condition without any chemical preservatives whatever, if proper methods of canning are followed.
