FIERSTEIN DENIES SPEEDING IN PARK

John Fierstein, who was arrested and fined this week on a charge of speeding in Bryant Park, denies that he was exceeding the speed limit and asserts that his arrest was a mistake and an injustice.

Fierstein states that he was driving out of the park in his Oakland Six, passing along the sandy road parallel with the Willamette river. He passed another car, turning out of the road, he said, and was not making more than 12 or 14 miles an hour.

He alleges that he was running in intermediate gear on account of the loose sand, and he had his cutoff open which made it seem to bystanders that he was going faster than he really was. Just after passing the other car and turning back into the road a defective steering knuckle on the left front wheel gave way and turned the car off its course, but it was brought to a stop within ten feet. Fierstein exhibits the broken piece, which shows that it has been broken for some time and was held together by but a small portion of the steel.

He states that he pleaded guilty because there seemed to be several people who disagreed with him and to fight the case would have meant the employing of a lawyer and going to other expense that would have been greater than the fine.
