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GERMAN EMIGRATION

A great emigration movement is arising in Germany as a result of the heavy taxes imposed for payment of the war indemnity.

This movement does not meet with any disapproval from the government; rather, the contrary.

The chief objective seems to be South America, particularly Argentina, Paraguay, Chile and Peru. Brazil is not much considered, because of the late strained relations between Germany and that country.

It is said that companies have been formed for the purpose of purchasing land abroad for colonies of German emigrants. It is believed that South America is a particularly favorable location for these colonies because the Latin countries will be the best market for German goods, and that through these settlements Germany can obtain large supplies of raw material which she sorely needs.

The United States of course will be interested in this proposed colonization scheme, and the other allies little

less so. For it may be felt that with drawal of numbers of workmen and a considerable amount of capital from Germany might affect the payment of her indemnities.

On the other hand it would mean supplying German home markets with raw materials that would facilitate manufacture, and the sale of those manufactures in countries which will not boycott German goods would of course improve Germany's financial position.

In any event, it behooves the United States to keep closely in touch with the situation in South America.

JOINING IN THE PARADE

In a letter from a committee having charge of its town's Fourth of July celebration, these words occur: "The committee wishes to take this method of expressing its gratitude for the assistance and support accorded it in every detail of the program, either marching or entering floats."

We are going to have need in the days ahead of a strong and visible Americanism; we cannot afford to hide the light of our patriotism under

the bushel of superiority or indifference.
