## MRS. BUSEY DIES AT HARRISBURG

### Heart Trouble Is Cause; Mrs. Anna James Is Buried

LEBANON, July 28.—Special.—William D. Busey received a message late Thursday announcing the death of his mother, Mrs. William Busey, at Harrisburg at the age of 80 years. Mrs. Busey had been in her usual state of health until a few moments before her death, which occurred suddenly from an attack of heart failure. Mr. and Mrs. Busey left for Harrisburg immediately.

LEBANON, July 28.—Mrs. Anna James, a well known and highly respected woman of this city, died suddenly at her home Monday evening from an attack of heart trouble at the age of 79 years, five months and 17 days. She was born Feb. 4, 1840 near Christiansburg, Sweden, and at the age of ten came to America with her parents and settled in Iowa.

She came to Linn county in 1888 and settled near Salsville where she lived continuously until after the death of her husband, Lewis James, who passed away in 1907.

About eight years ago she took up her residence in Lebanon where she has continued to reside until her death. Of ten children born to her she is survived by seven, one of whom is Bert James, a businessman of this city.

The funeral was conducted from the home Wednesday morning by Rev. Hendricks of the Christian church and the body laid to rest in the Dodge cemetery by the side of her husband.

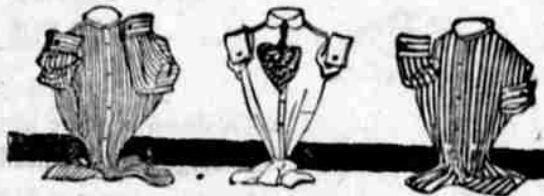
