WRITES OF WORK

Former Albany Man Tells of Army Life at Nantes, France

The following letter from Major Ed Stewart to his father, Postmaster C. H. Stewart, will be of interest to his many friends in this city. Written from Nantes, France, where he is in charge of the sanitary work of the embarkation office, the letter states:

"You may perhaps have noticed an apparent discrepancy between the address appearing in the caption of this letter and that on the envelope. In explanation I may say that I am writing from Nantes, but shall be stationed in St. Nazaire as executive officer for the embarkation surgeon. Thus it appears that I shall wind up my service in France at the same place where I began it. My duties in the new assignment will be a general supervision over the preparation of returning troops for embarkation to America. And from their nature it seems probable that I may have to be the 'last dog hung.' When all the rest of the bunch have gone it may become my sad lot to pull up the gang plank and pronounce the last farewell to France for the American army. Still, I am going to make what effort I can to get away before the actual finish, and may be successful. But even if I have to stay for the finish it cannot be very long delayed. The troops are pouring through the western ports as rapidly now as they were coming in last summer during the crisis of the war. At the camp where I shall be stationed we have to be prepared to examine and furnish clearance for as many as 10,000 men in one day. It is naturally a very busy place, which helps considerably for the work is very uninteresting and very much of a drudgery. It is rather uncertain just when I shall be able to get away, but I rather expect to start next month, or during the early part of August at the latest."

"By that time there will be nothing left of our activities in France except what troops are left as an army of occupation. The cleanup up of our work is being expedited by sale to France, England and Belgium of most of our enormous accumulations of stores of all kinds. But in spite of that disposal of material immense trains of war stuff are going through to the coast every day, and in almost inconceivable manner."

"We have an immense supply depot just out of St. Nazaire which is connected to the coast by a railroad. There are scores of first-class warehouses and approximately 200,000 tons of all kinds of goods. When and how they will ever be able to clear them out the Lord only knows. The probability is that when we are tired of shipping the stuff home the balance will be either sold or burned. The French are not at all anxious to have the goods. As for the situation there are troops everywhere all over everything and all around about at eight cents per pair. That is of course ridiculous for if there was worth anything at all there would be more than that much. But that is only a fair example of the sort of bargains we have been giving the French ever since we came over here. It actually seems that our government has taken advantage of every opportunity to permit themselves to be 'beaten' as a cloak for charity to the French. But I suppose they need it, for they are in a pretty bad fix. The worst of it is that their national credit and their economic conditions in general are apparently going from bad to worse. Whatever happens to them, however, we need never feel that our obligations to the French for any past favors are not fully redeemed."

BROWNSVILLE RESIDENT HERE ON BUSINESS TRIP

This is particularly true, he says, of the business district, where several fine, new buildings will be erected within the next few months. The residences burned will not be rebuilt so rapidly.

He states that in his opinion the heavy loss was not due to lack of fire equipment, for there was plenty of hose, plenty of water pressure and plenty of equipment. The trouble lay in not getting water onto the fire in time, due to lack of care of the apparatus. The hose was mixed up, but when it was once straightened out, and water begun playing on the flames, many buildings that had caught fire were saved.

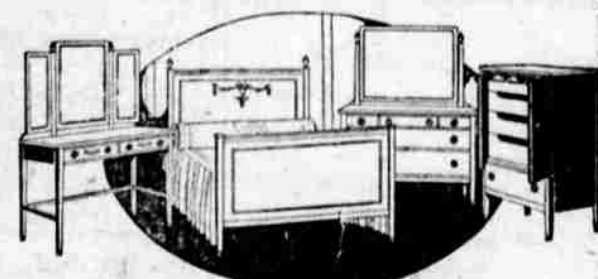
