Stolen Treasures On part of the German peace treaty which aroused widespread and derisive comment was that which obligated Germany to return the skill of an African potentate, astronomical instruments taken from the royal observatory of Peking and various other curious and precious articles stolen at various times from various parts of the world by the Germans.

There are similar provisions in the Austrian treaty. Some of the treasures the Austrian government is asked to return to their owners are the crown jewels of the Medici family, long famous as rulers of Florence and patrons of art and letters; a 'virgin' painted by Andrea del Sarto and three manuscripts taken from Modena; some carvings of the twelfth century, made for Norman kings, filched from Palermo; 98 manuscripts carried off by the Austrians from Naples in 1718; various documents and objects of art removed from Belgium in 1794, and a gold cup of King Louis IV removed from Poland in 1772.

This is coming back pretty far to recall stolen goods. Austria will win little sympathy in her forest work of penitent restoration; she has been one of the most rapacious of freebooting powers. Still there is a certain peril in setting such precedents. The various capitals of Europe contain only too many prized objects that came there by questionable methods. It used to be the com-

mon thing for the winner of a war to take what he wanted in the way of art as well as other commodities. The spoils of Egypt and other helpless countries have been scattered pretty widely.

If there remained any hostile power likely to call them to account, our worthy allies would surely feel nervous as they contemplated the museum of London, Paris and Rome, stuffed with the treasures of many lands.

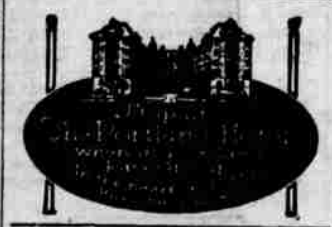
