A famous engineer, Buckner Speed, in a current magazine warns against the danger of passing safety-first laws that will make air achievement difficult. He tells the story of Walter Hancock, an Englishman who in 1831 tried to apply the principle of the steam engine to road travel. He built a little steam-bus—"the pictures of it look not unlike the Fifth Avenue bus of the present day"—which worked. It could make 32 miles an

hour, it carried passengers, and he was able to make it pay.

Then all the stage-coach people rose in wrath, and Parliament was induced to pass a supposedly "safety-first" act, forbidding engines from traveling on any road except at a rate of speed not to exceed four miles an hour, and requiring that the engine-driven vehicle be preceded by a man on horseback waving a red flag.

The result, says Mr. Speed, was that "England, having its fingertips almost closing around the automobile at that time, found progress along that line paralyzed—and the automobile was developed 60 years later in France."

Air laws will have to be made, air traffic regulated. But the motives underneath them need to be directed toward the development of the traffic and not toward its hampering.

The Useful Green Pasture

School teachers are leaving their jobs in such numbers that education seems seriously endangered. Not even the most desirable cities have their full quotas, and many a country district has closed its school.

An agriculture magazine maintains that "business is stripping our agricultural colleges of their best young men." In both these cases the green pastures that look so alluring from a distance are some form of business. There are not enough nurses anywhere. There was a belief that when the war was over and the flu had died down there would be nurses to spare, but this is not the case. Many of the nurses have joined the women's land armies.

City newspapers are crowded with advertisements for skilled industrial workers. And city men everywhere are going back to the farm.

It looks, at first glance, as if these people, in the face of the demand, would do far better to stay in the profession for which they are fitted. But

there is another side.

Most people realize that education has been failing to educate. Boys and girls spend years in school without learning the things which they need to know. The farms have failed to keep their boys and girls—those have fled to the cities. And city life for the industrial or clerical worker, male or female, has not been very satisfactory.

The shakeup due to the prevalent unrest may be the best of happenings in the long run. All these people who have sought new work bring with them a freshness of outlook upon it not given to those already deep in the rut. Education, farming, nursing, business, industry, will all doubtless benefit from shaking out the dead wood of uninterested workers, and from introducing new vigor and new ideas. Reconstruction is bound to bring unsettlement of many kinds with it, and we may as well get what- ever good is possible out of the mix-up.
