EXPORTS RAISE PRICES

One of the principal causes of high prices is the exportation of American commodities in tremendous and increasing quantities.

Last April American goods were exported to the amount of over \$700,000,000, breaking the record.

In June, 1918, the country exported \$54,000,000 worth of breadstuffs. In June, 1919, that figure was more than doubled.

It is largely this foreign market that sets the price levels for standard commodities here at home.

Monopoly and profiteering may be checked; but can much be accomplished as long as this European market is eagerly bidding for American products, and getting them?

Is it likely that any considerable reduction can be made in the price

of foodstuffs, clothing and shoes unless there is a limit placed on exportation? And is the American government, or American business, or the American public prepared to take any such drastic step?

A NEW GERMAN SPIRIT?

Maximilian Harden, writing in the New York World, presents what he considers genuine evidence of a new spirit in Germany.

"From a small group whose ideal is the restoration of an armed empire, proud of the number of its bayonets, comes a cry for revenge. This ideal and this cry we combat with all our force."

To this the foreign minister has added: "We wish to show ourselves to the world as a peaceful nation. The sword cannot and must not longer be the means of German diplomacy."

The natural impulse of the reader in the United States or any other allied country is to smile in derision at these words.

But whoever takes this view, says Harden, makes an unjust and dangerous mistake. He maintains that the men who uttered these sentiments are sincere, and that they represent a sincere purpose of the German government and the people back of it.

If the word of any German can be taken, perhaps that German is Harden. His assurance at least calls for a respectful willingness to be 'shown'.

If the Germans mean what they say, there is hope for Germany after all, and even for German-American relations hereafter.
