Germans Mark Girls Seen With Americans in Germany

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES IN GERMANY, July 21.—A. P. Correspondence.—Posters written in German and warning German girls against associating with Americans appeared recently in several public places in Coblenz and other towns on the Rhine, the girls being urged to refrain from making the acquaintance of soldiers regardless of the signing of the peace treaty. At various times posters have been put up threatening indiscreet girls with punishment. American officers who have investigated say the Germans are determined that girls who associate with the soldiers shall have their names made known to the populace and that several secret societies have been formed for that purpose. Intelligence of-

ficers say that on several occasions the names of girls who are on the records of the German police for associating with Americans have been read to the congregations at Sunday morning church services. In other villages the practice of posting the girls' names in public places was inaugurated some time ago.
