Heart City to Have New Hardware Store Building, Country Club

CORVALLIS, Aug. 29.—The building revival has not escaped Corvallis. The Whiteside & Lock implement concern at Third and Madison streets closed a deal last Friday for the August Hodes property, 50 by 100 feet, adjoining their present location on the south, says the Gazette-Times. They will at once begin the erection of a two-story brick structure which they hope to occupy by January 1. A brick addition is being built at the rear of the Lilly confectionery store on Second street to take care of the expansion of their business. The Corvallis Country Club will begin construction of a \$6,000 clubhouse at Scott Hill, two miles southwest of the city. The structure will possess a main room 40 feet long with huge fireplace, ladies' room, kitchen, men's lockerroom and other conveniences. Other buildings are under way and others are planned in this city. Corvallis is also badly in need of more residences.

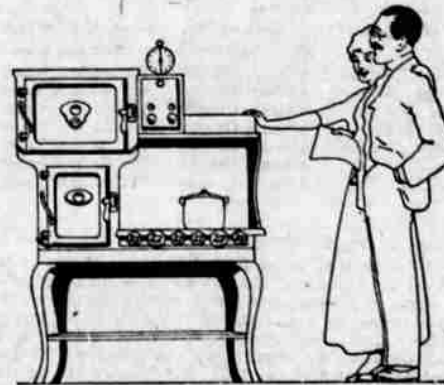
