BOYS AND GIRLS TO JUDGE STOCK

Pig, Calf and Sheep Clubs Getting Ready for Annual Contests

PORTLAND, Aug. 26.—By A. P.—Thousands of boys and girls, members of pig clubs, calf clubs, sheep clubs and goat clubs throughout the Northwest, are grooming their pets and brushing up on their own stock-judging technique for a series of elimination contests to be conducted by their state leaders for the purpose of singling out the finest show animals and the cleverest boys and girls to compete for premiums, trophies and medals hung up by the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, at its ninth annual stock show to be held here Nov. 17-22 inclusive.

State Leader H. C. Seymour has declared that in Oregon alone there are more than 5,000 boys and girls in the livestock clubs under his supervision. The stock-judging contest for the boys' and girls' clubs will be conducted in connection with that of the student-judges from different Northwestern colleges, and teams of boys and girls will be sent from the various districts. The elimination contests will be held to determine the personnel.

Accommodations will be provided on the exposition grounds for the club boys and in nearby homes for the club girls, in order that they may spend practically all their time at the stock show, studying the finest purebreds from all sections of the country, which will be assembled under the roof of the new quarter-million dollar Pacific International Exposition building.
