Punish The Fire Starters

August sees increasing forest fires in Oregon and Washington. Some of these fires are started by lightning which is beyond control of man. But many of them are started by criminally negligent campers, tourists and home people who know the dangers.

Oregon has made a start in the

right direction. Its fire wardens have secured the evidence and brought charges against numerous prominent persons for starting dangerous fires in the woods.

These parties, all of whom know the dangers, set fires by dry logs, etc., and endanger life and forests.

A man would be strictly dealt with who endangers lives and property in a city or town through wilful carelessness with fires. But this same man will go out camping and think nothing of setting a fire that may sweep hundreds and thousands of acres of land.

The public is beginning to realize that timber is our chief natural asset and a blow at our timber is a blow at the prosperity of the state.

Every man, woman and child should be taught to fight and prevent fires and report persons who are setting them carelessly. As our population grows, fires become more costly and dangerous and the man who starts them a greater menace to the community.

ROADS TO TRAVEL OVER

Highways are meant to travel over. That is the test which the highways now building and to be built must meet, says the Implement and Tractor Journal. The doughboys, it says, are returning to tell of roads in France which had been kept good for centuries, and which were able to sustain the heavy traffic of huge motor lorries without going to pieces. A road which can do that is a real road, not a political imitation. And it is real roads, capable of standing up under the heavy pounding of the present and future, which the American public is now demanding.

For ten or fifteen years roads have been talked about, and their purpose,

apparently, was to be talked about. But now the movement has gone beyond the talking stage.

If this is really true, it is indeed cause for congratulation. But there must be no cheer raised until we are out of the woods—until hundreds of miles of built-for-the-ages roads have actually been constructed and tried out.

The important point in all the road-building plans and activities must be that makeshifts will no longer do. The traffic of the country has outgrown them. Solid, honest highways—highways meant to be traveled over—are the only thing that will serve.
