TABLET LIKE HIS GREAT-GRANDPA'S TO HONOR HERO

Santa Ana, Calif., Aug. 25.—Nathaniel Rochester, of Santa Ana, who will be honored here in the same fashion that his great-grandfather col-

onel Nathaniel Rochester, founder of the city of Rochester, N. Y., and one of Washington's officers in the Revolutionary war was honored in the city he founded.

In St. Luke's church, Rochester, is a bronze tablet, in memory of a colonel Rochester. A replica will be placed in the Episcopal church here. It will bear this inscription:

"In memory of Nathaniel Rochester, Co. B. 308th U. S. Infantry, Born Nov. 28, 1897. Killed in France while fighting for the 'lost Battalion', Oct. 8, 1918. 'Just like skipping a grade in school.'"

In a letter written to his mother while he was at the front Rochester said that "making the supreme sacrifice" would be just like skipping a grade in school.
