Good Oelcrism

Dr. Oaler is 70 years old, and still useful.

It isn't necessary to greet this announcement with a grin. Dr. Oaler was always more misunderstood than misunderstood. He may have been misquoted. In any event those people failed to "get" him when he spoke of 40 years as an age-limit of usefulness.

This scolarly old physician is useful at 70 because he has followed his own doctrine, which he gave, some 30 years ago, as follows:

"When a man can bring home neither wax nor honey, he should in the interests of an institution by dissolved from the hive to give more laborers room."

That sounds like a quotation from a classical poet. Dr Oaler amplified it thus:

"He must walk with the boys, or else he is irrevocably lost. To keep his mind receptive, elastic and impressionable he must travel with the men who are doing the work of the world, the men between the ages of 25 and 40."

Every practical man of affairs, or of science or literature or any other field of human achievement, knows the truth of this. Most of the creative work of the world is really done by "the boys" between 25 and 40. Most of the ideas are originated by them and put over by them.

Usefulness need not end, however, at 40. It will not end there if the man reaching that goal still "walks with the boys," keeping their freshness of view and plasticity of mind. "Has any old fellow got mixed with the boys?" asked Oliver Wendell Holmes, in a famous poem addressed to his grey-haired classmates. His conclusion was about the same as that attributed to Dr Oaler: "If he has, put him out, with out making a noise." But it rests with the individual whether he shall be put out. He need not let himself turn into an "old fellow". It is the characteristic of genius to remain young to the end. People who are not geniuses may still remain their youth, and accordingly their usefulness to themselves and society, if they will keep the youthful viewpoint. This is the true Oelcrism.

As To Price-Fixing

Many people continued to regard public price-regulation as a panacea for present difficulties, and would go so far as to apply the principle to commodities of all kinds. But, says Hon. er Hoyt of the War Trade Board, must fix thousands of prices. If it must fix thousands of prices, it must fix retail prices, it must fix wholesale prices else the retailer will be forced out of business. If it fixes wholesale prices, it must fix costs, for the supreme court will not issue a writ of mandamus to compel a manufacturer to produce at a loss.

"If it fixes costs at a lower level, it must inevitably fix wages at a lower level, for wages are the ultimate basis of costs."

"Wages are the chief element in the expense of marketing raw materials. Thus the end of the gigantic price-fixing undertaking would be a lowering of wages. Lower prices brought by lower wages would be a fruitless trade."

It is probably a fair statement. The government has done a little price-regulating, during the war and since, successfully because of special conditions, which seem to have wroked rather ditions. But there can be no assurance that the thing will work well if applied generally.

CASCADIA CROWDED WITH VACATIONISTS

Government Rangers Show Results of Careful Organization by Work

A comparison of the difference in efficiency of state and government forest services was noted by Judge C. H. Stewart on a recent trip to Cascadia. The government forces are much better organized and go after things in a much more business-like way, he says. An instance is recited in the fire on Moose Creek, eight miles above Cascadia, which Ranger Elliott, in charge of the work in that district, happened to run onto Sunday.
