PICTORIAL WAR HISTORY

The government took 160 miles of motion picture negatives during the war. There are more than 47,000 still pictures of army and navy activities overseas and at home. It is estimated that these pictures will fill 12 400-page volumes.

There is talk of authorizing the war department to print these pictures in book form in order to make them available to the general public. Whether this is done or not, these pictures are of interest as one of the elements of modern warfare. There

was never before a war in which so much history has been recorded on the photographic plate. France, Belgium and England have photographs and paintings which will prove to all the world and to posterity the crimes committed in the early weeks of the German invasion. Many of the new devices perfected and put into operation in this war are shown in action in these pictures.

When school children study the history of the world war in future years their textbooks should be liberally illustrated with actual photographs of scenes and people and places important to the piecing together of the whole big struggle.

The snapshots brought back to this country by soldiers and war workers are already proving an education to the home people. In a bigger way the official pictures taken by the various governments will educate future generations.
