**MORE WORK**

A Boston banker when asked the other day how to reduce high prices said "work another hour a day." His idea was to increase production and, thus, by catching up with demand, bring prices down.

Of course the Boston banker might have amplified his advice but if he didn't, he is a poor economist. His advice would stand if everyone would

work an extra hour a day without pay but nowadays no one will work without pay.

If everyone worked an extra hour a day and was paid for the extra hour it would, no doubt, increase production but there would hardly be a reduction of prices unless the workers saved their pay for that extra hour. That is the nab of the whole question of prices.

Either production must be increased and demand held at the present level and demand increased. If production is increased by working an extra hour a day and the fruits of the extra hour are spent, the situation is not changed one whit.

There is just one way to lower prices. Stop buying things that are not vitally necessary and save regularly. The United States government recognizes that and asks the people of the United States to force prices down by purchasing War Savings Stamps and Treasury Savings Certificates bringing in four per cent interest compounded every three months.

Ask your mail man about them.

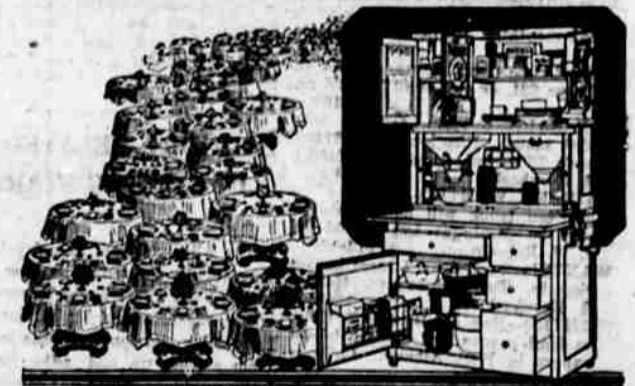
