Notice to Farmers

On account of the shortage of cars and a strike which has been called against all flouring mills in Portland, we are unable to ship very much Wheat or Oats to Portland and are full at Tangent and will be full at Tallman by Monday. We will start our mill at Albany Monday or Tuesday and grind about 1,000 bushels per day. We still have room for a few thousand sacks of clean, Spring Wheat at the Johnson Warehouse at Albany and are constructing a room on the mill proper to hold about 7,000 sacks. We will be unable to clean this wheat but will pay it on sample at Government Price and pay Cash for it. The dirty wheat will have to take its turn as fast as we grind out at the mill. We will under no circumstances take any wet or soft grain except by special arrangement. We are still paying \$2.00 for No. 1 wheat; other grades in proportion.
