SAFETY WEEK
September 28 to October 4 has been chosen by the National Safety Council to be observed as "Safety Week" and no community can afford to neglect special observation of this time.

In one city a huge clock has been

erected, to tell off the number of traffic accidents which may occur during the week, and placed near it will be a record of the number of accidents during the corresponding week a year ago. It is hoped that the number this year will be so noticeably reduced as to confirm in people's minds the value of taking deliberate pains to avoid being injured or inflicting injury upon others.

That city, having chosen constructive suggestion as its type of observance for Safety Week, will emphasize the safety device and the safety first idea, and will conduct a publicity campaign for the avoidance of accident, rather than merely demonstrate the unfortunate results of carelessness. There is to be a parade, however, one feature of which is distinctly in the horrible-example line. It is to consist of 100 "casualties," bandaged to represent the results of common-sense and industrial mishaps. Persons not sufficiently impressed by the more cheerful suggestions may take warning from this parade of victims and get their lesson in that way.

The percentage of avoidable accidents is very high. If, by taking thought for one week in the year, the public can acquire the habit of taking care for all the rest of the year, Safety Week will pay for itself a thousand fold.

BETTER SITES—BETTER STOCK
On October 1 the Department of Agriculture in co-operation with state agricultural colleges and other agencies will begin a drive to foster interest in "Better Sites—Better Stock."

A certificate is to be designed and presented to every owner of farm animals of any type who uses only purebred sires. It makes no difference

whether the owner be man or woman, or whether he or she possesses only one animal of the class of domestic stock specified. It is believed that in this way a competitive spirit may be aroused among the farmers of the country, with the result that poor and scrub stock will gradually disappear. The tendency to include the small farmer and stock breeder in these movements is an excellent thing. It is human nature to feel that if one's possessions are small it makes little difference whether they are operated along the best lines. The result is that there is much inefficiency in small scale farming and breeding, and much unnecessary labor with unsatisfactory results.

It is straight to the financial advantage of any owner of animals that they shall be of the best type procurable for the purpose for which they are kept. The original may be greater, but so will be the ultimate return, and in greatly increased proportion.

One Frenchman's Sacrifice.
Thirteen sons died, that represents part of the war's cost to a French farmer who lived at Roubaix, near Ypres—surely a record. He had 36 children, and 20 of his 22 sons fought on the various fronts. 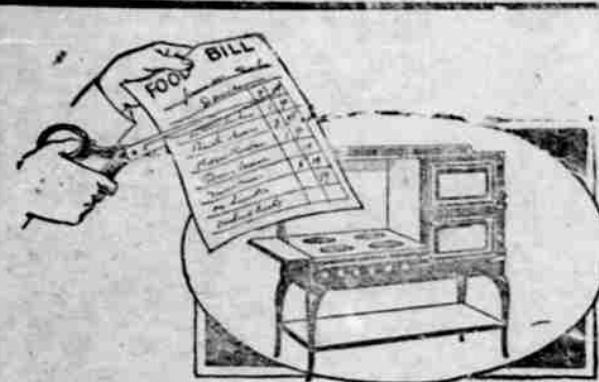
